

Swedes Lay On Million Dollar Display For Visiting Royalty

STOCKHOLM (AP) — Sweden engineered a million-dollar show to greet the Queen and the Duke of Edinburgh on their arrival today by yacht for the first official British state visit to Stockholm since Edward VII.

The crowded capital was even more clogged with the influx of thousands of Swedes and foreign visitors for the extravaganza that court officials indicated would cost more than 5,000,000 crowns (\$1,000,000).

Behind the pomp and ceremony, the foreign offices of both nations concluded an agreement, it was disclosed by high authorities, that further binds the ties of friendship.

The agreement extends the benefits of British and Swedish social security systems to their nationals living in the respective countries. This means several thousand Swedes living in England will be granted sick benefits and financial assistance when in distress, as though they were living at home and the same applies to an estimated several thousand British subjects residing in Sweden.

Foreign Secretary Selwyn Lloyd came to Stockholm Thursday for the signing of the pact which will take place at the Swedish foreign ministry today. Lloyd will have several general conversations with the Swedish ministry officials, said, but the subjects were not revealed.

Meatime Operation Polish was in full swing in Stockholm to ready the city for three full days of official activity by the British royal party after which the 1956 Olympic equestrian games and settle down on their yacht, the Britannia, for another week of "unofficial" stay.

The Britannia was plowing through the Baltic on schedule and was due to be met by Swedish escort vessels today.

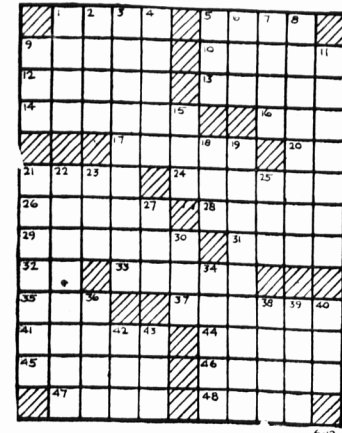
Four thousand troops and 1,300 policemen will be on duty to protect the royal party and security officers are figuring on upwards of 300,000 people along the route of the state drive from the point of debarkation through downtown Stockholm and to the palace of King Gustav Adolf.

Key Figure In Old Murder Trial Suffers Stroke

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Evelyn Nesbit, a beauty of 50 years ago and a key figure in one of the most sensational murder trials of the era, suffered a cerebral stroke Saturday.

Park View Hospital attendants described her condition today as satisfactory.

Miss Nesbit, now 71, has been living alone in an apartment where she pursued a career as a sculptor and art instructor.

She was practically penniless until 20th Century-Fox bought the rights to her life story and made the movie *The Girl in the Red Velvet Swing*.

It was in 1906 that her former husband, Harry K. Thaw, a millionaire playboy, shot and killed Stanford White, the country's most noted architect.

Thaw, jealous of his wife's premarital romance with White, charged that White had "ruined" his wife before her marriage.

Miss Nesbit's testimony at the trial was credited with getting Thaw off with committal to an asylum. Thaw died nine years ago at the age of 76.

MONTREAL (CP) — Police said nine-year-old Robert Jones, missing from his suburban Montreal North home since Friday, was found dead Sunday about 1 1/2 miles from his home.

Police said the boy was believed to be a victim of a sexual attack. His body, with the head badly smashed, was found behind a service station following a two-day search.

Police, firemen, boy scouts and sea scouts Saturday combed the district until darkness and resumed their search today.

Georgetown School District Holds Annual Meeting

The annual meeting of the ratepayers of Georgetown School District No. 1 was held in the town hall on Tuesday evening June 5th at 8:00 p.m. Twenty-two ratepayers were in attendance.

Mayor P.L. Boudreau was appointed chairman of the meeting. The secretary of the board of trustees, Mrs. N.W. Hansen read the minutes of the last annual meeting, which were adopted as read.

Mr. Raymond W. Solomon, chairman of the trustee board presented the annual report of the trustees, which was adopted. Mr. Solomon gave a detailed report of the general work carried on by the board and of the various improvements which were made in the school during the past term.

The interior was painted, 37 desks purchased, two new chalk boards were purchased and a new stove. The proceeds from a play put on by several of the school grades were turned over to the school, as were the proceeds of a pantry sale.

The auditors report was received and it showed total receipts of \$6,699.76 and total expenditures of \$6,456.57. There was a bank balance of \$21.43 and cash on hand of \$243.19. A considerable sum is still owing on the current year's taxes.

It was moved that in future a new practice would be followed in auditing the books by including a statement of all assets and liabilities. Mr. Arnold Whiteman of Montague was appointed as auditor for the ensuing year.

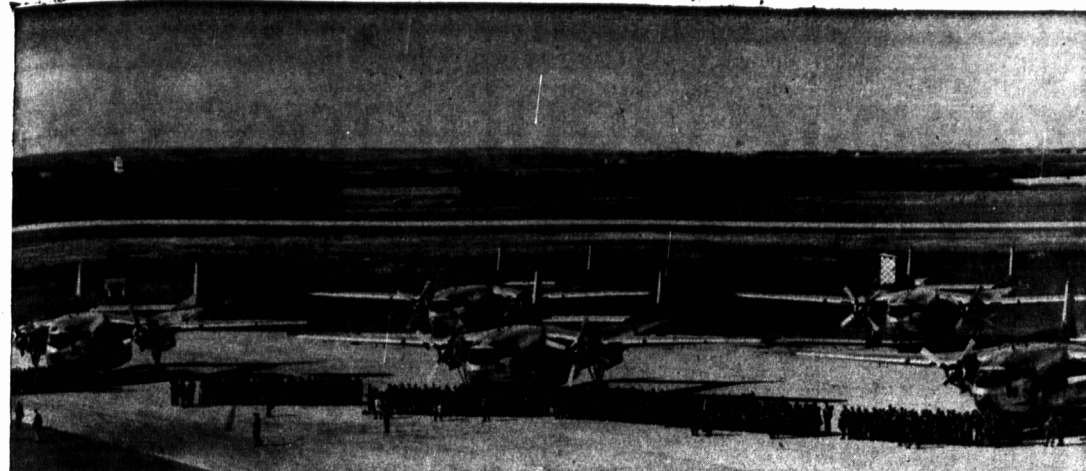
The supervisors report was read to the meeting and adopted following some discussion. NEW SCHOOL

The question of building a new school was discussed and it was moved that the trustee board and three members of the town council be appointed to gather information regarding the financing of a new school.

The amount of \$2900.00 was voted for teachers supplement and the amount of \$2200.00 for school running expenses.

Mr. Howard S. MacLean was appointed to fill the vacancy on the board of trustees caused by the resignation of Mr. Raymond W. Solomon, who completed his term of office. A vote of thanks was extended to Mr. Solomon for faithfully and capably fulfilling his duties on the board during his tenure of office. Mr. Solomon replied and thanked the ratepayers and trustees for their co-operation.

Mr. Albert King and Mr. Temple MacDonald were appointed trustees for Burnt Point and Georgetown Royalty. The minutes of the meeting were read by the secretary and the meeting adjourned.



FLYING BOXCARS MOVE SOLDIERS TO CAMP GAGETOWN

Six R.C.A.F. C-119 flying boxcars of 435 and 436 Transport Squadron assembled at R.C.A.F. Station Namoo Thursday to carry out the second phase of the R.C.A.F.'s annual airlift of Canadian army troops from British Columbia to Camp Gagetown, N.B. for summer training. 253 troops of the 1st Field Engineer Regiment, Royal Canadian Engineers, under the command of Major R. Buckley, Calgary, arrived in Edmonton by rail from Chilliwack and Victoria to emplane for the 2,100-mile flight. The first flight carrying an 80 man advance party left Namoo May 31. The final airlift of 173 troops will take place June 18.

Veteran Legislator Leading Liberals In New Brunswick

FREDERICTON (CP) — A long been prominent in New Brunswick agriculture, having served as president of the provincial farmers' and dairymen's, fox breeders' and sheep breeders' associations.

He was also secretary of the New Brunswick Potato Growers' Association in 1918 and managed a farmers' co-operative store at Salisbury, buying the business in 1930. The store was closed in 1935 when he became agriculture minister. He continued in that office 17 years, through Premier McNair's administration, as one of four members for Westmorland, where he is contesting his seventh election.

A Baptist and member of the Masonic order, Mr. Taylor graduated from the Nova Scotia Agricultural College with honors in 1914.

In 1950 he was an adviser with a delegation representing the Canadian Federation of Agriculture at a convention in Sweden of the International Federation of Agricultural Producers. He toured Great Britain, Denmark, Sweden, Finland and Norway, studying agricultural policies and organizations.
