### Notes and Comments.

— One of the extraordinary objects exhibit at the recent exhibition in Montreal was what is claimed to be the oldest pipe dug up from the site of old Hochelaga. — Among the callers on Minister Downey, a few days ago, were twelve representative Scotch farmers who have been spying out the Canadian Northwest with a view to inducing Scandinavian settlers in the New England States to move westward. The delegates are delighted with their visit of inspection, and predict most successful results. Mr. Keis, agent of the Dominion steamship line at Gothenburg, is also in the Northwest. He predicts a large Scandinavian immigration direct from the old sod next spring. He is accompanied by Swedish capitalists who have made some important investments.

— In the course of his report concerning the Maritime Provinces, Mr. Thomas Davey, the English farmer delegate, says to those whom he represented: "If you do not understand farm work and country life, or some of the industries peculiar to those provinces, stay where you are. On the other hand, to the industrious and thrifty, and those whose lot may be hard one in this country, opportunities present themselves of securing the necessities of life, especially having regard to what I have already mentioned as to the indifferent farming that now prevails in that part of Canada. While there may not be so many very wealthy as in this country, on the other hand, there are very few who are poor, or in any way dependent on the charity of others."

— The German press, which is not quite as quick to reflect the thoughts of the hour as its English and American rivals, has at last awakened to the fact that an attempt to tamper with the universal suffrage system of the Empire has been manifest of late in high places. The Volks Zeitung remarks: "It would mean nothing less than the enslavement of the working classes, newly degenerated in the fashion of the nineteenth century. The consequence would be a revolution—a real living revolution. Institutions like universal suffrage may be introduced, but once they have struck their roots in the land they cannot be demolished. Workmen can never be deprived of their right to vote. Only the most arrant fanatics imagine that such plans can be executed without disturbance of the peace."

— The Canadian make of cheese is likely to attract attention at the Chicago exhibition. An Ottawa correspondent says: "The World's Columbian exhibition of 1893 is evidently going to be an affair of big things. Everything promises to be on a mammoth scale, and there is, seeing that Canada is to take part in the air, it is only right that she should do her share towards conveying an idea of the colossal nature of the exposition. Reference was made a few days ago to the mammoth cheese which Canada will exhibit at Chicago next year, and the Empire is now enabled to give some further particulars in reference to this gigantic specimen of our dairy products. The cheese was made at the Dominion experimental station at Perth under the direction of Prof. Robertson, dairy commissioner, and will certainly rank as the mammoth cheese of the world. It weighs over 22,000 pounds and contains the curd of a day's milk from 10,000 cows. A gigantic oak-press was erected for the purpose of constructing the cheese and 200 tons of pressure was applied. The mould or hoop is made of steel boiler plate, five-sixths of an inch thick. The cheese will be turned upside-down twice a week until perfectly cured, and already it has been pronounced perfect in texture, flavor and color. The plans and preparations for its manufacture were so suitable and adequate that no amount of curd was wasted or spoiled in the process. The cheese will be placed in the pyramid of Canadian dairy products at the World's Fair and will afterwards be cut up and sold in pound blocks either in Chicago or in one of the large cities of Great Britain."

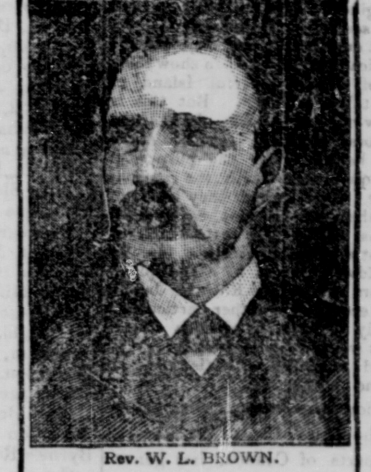
