

Dodgers Win Nine Straight To Lead League By 2 Games

(Canadian Press) Brooklyn ran its winning streak to nine straight Sunday to increase its National League lead to two games as the Chicago White Sox kept pace with front runner Cleveland in the American by extending their winning streak to five.

The Dodgers climaxed an uphill drive, putting together four straight hits after two were out in the 10th inning to defeat the Chicago White Sox 6-4. Jackie Robinson's fourth hit drove in the tie-breaking run. His first hit was a home run.

Heavy hitting by Jim Rivera and Minnie Minoso and strong pitching by Sandy Consuegra and Jack Harsham gave the White Sox a 5-3 and a 6-0 sweep of their doubleheader with Washington and kept them within percentage points of the league lead over the Indians.

Cleveland captured two close games from the Philadelphia Athletics, 2-1 and 7-5, to pick up a full game on the third place New York Yankees who split with Baltimore. The Yankees took their second game 5-2 after the Oriole had come from behind to win the opener 7-5.

Boston's Red Sox spotted Detroit three runs in the first inning and battled back to triumph over the Tigers 7-4.

THIRD PLACE TIE

Philadelphia's Phillies climbed into a third place tie with Milwaukee, only one game behind the runner-up New York Giants, in taking an 11-8 slugfest from the St. Louis Cardinals. Bobby Morgan's grand slam homer highlighted a six-run first inning. The Phillies added five more in the seventh after the Cards had tied the score at the Giants divided 3-2 in two games.

Cincinnati and Pittsburgh held the Braves to a split, winning the second game 6-4 after Jim Wilson had pitched Milwaukee to a 4-0 first game victory. Monte Irvin's 10th homer in the eighth inning broke up a 2-2 tie in the first game in favor of New York.

Rivera was the big gun of the first White Sox victory, blasting two homers and a double and scoring three times as Consuegra

gained his sixth victory against one defeat. Minoso, who drove in two runs in the opener, batted in two more in the second game while rookie Harsham blanked the Nats with seven hits.

A trio of triples paved the way for the Indians' double victory over Philadelphia that enabled them to project their eight percentage point lead over the White Sox. Home runs by Dave Philley and George Strickland and two sacrifice flies gave Bob Feller his 25th triumph in the opener. Rookie catcher Hal Naragon's triple with the bases loaded provided the winning margin in the night cap.

REYNOLDS WINS SIXTH

A two-run triple by Bob Kennedy highlighted a four-run game as the Orioles' Joe Coleman hit his sixth victory of the season. Allie Reynolds hurled a five-hitter and fanned eight to register his sixth triumph in seven decisions in the nightcap. Mickey Mantle's 10th homer with a man on base was the big blow. The Yankees took their second game 5-2 after the Oriole had come from behind to win the opener 7-5.

Aussies Win Commonwealth Amateur Golf Tournament

ST. ANDREWS, Scotland, (Carri-ers)—Australia jauntily carried off its second major golf victory in Britain within two weeks by capturing the bicentenary Commonwealth amateur tournament Saturday.

Canada finished second, drubbing Britain on the final day of the round-robin tournament to drop the Aussies' chief threat into third place.

The Australians, in their final match at the Royal and Ancient Club here, overwhelmed South Africa five games to two with two halved.

They wound up the tournament with a record of three victories and one halved match against their four Commonwealth rivals—Britain, Canada, New Zealand and South Africa.

Australian Doug Bechli, who last week won the British amateur championship, retained an unbeaten singles record in Britain by defeating Jim Boyd, ex-South African open champ, by one hole in Saturday's final round.

Canada's record was two wins and two losses, followed by Britain with one win, two halved and one loss; South Africa with one win, one halved and two losses, and New Zealand with one win and

three losses.

Britain, which started on Saturday with one victory and two draws, was Australia's closest challenger but its hopes were smashed when Canada won five games to three with one halved.

Britain led 2 to 0 with one halved after the foursomes but lost five of the six singles.

Canadian winners in the singles were Walt McElroy of Vancouver, 2 and 1 over G.H. Micklem; Don Doe of Granby, Que., 2 and 1 over D. A. Blair; Phil Farley of Toronto, 1 up over I. Caldwell; Nick Weslock of Windsor, Ont., 4 and 3 over J. C. Wilson; and Doug Silverberg of Red Deer, Alta., 1 up over A. Thirwell. The only Canadian loss in the singles was 4- and-3 setback handed Bob Fleming of Victoria, B. C., by F. W. Deighton.
