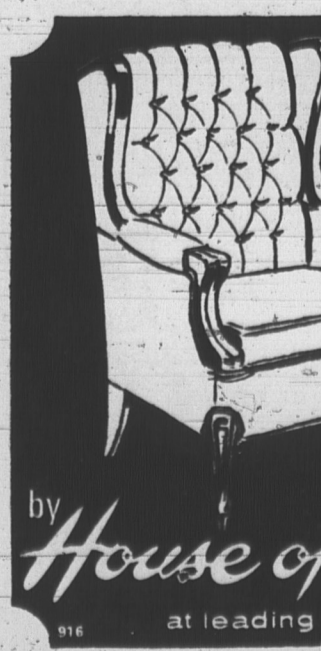

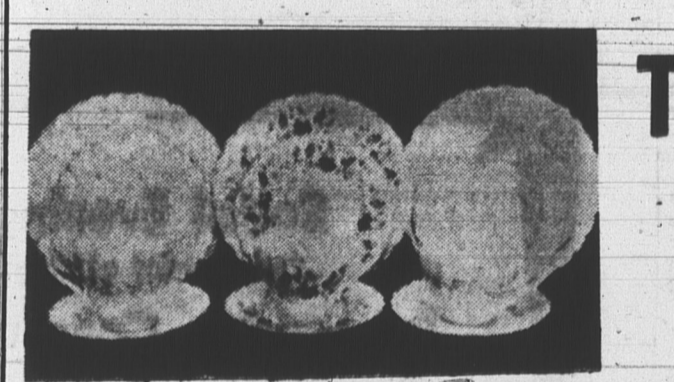
The meeting closed with the Mizpah benediction, after which refreshments were served by the hostesses, Iva Jay and Bessie Birt.

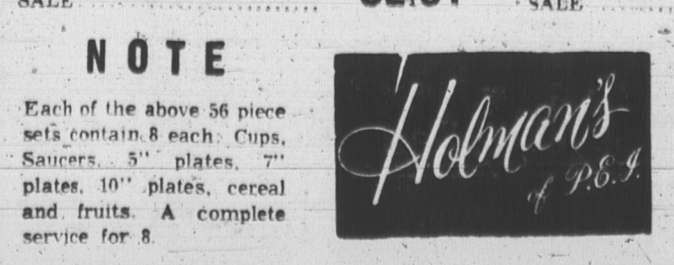
