HAS THE GOVERNMENT CHARGE OF PUBLIC WORKS?

Sir,—I wish to call the attention of the people to the disingenuous tactics of the Government in the extravagant expenditure of the peoples' money on Public Works. In the first instance I might mention a side track, which is being built at Emerald Junction. No one objects to the building of this track as I believe it is very necessary and will save the Cape Traverse branch train considerable trouble in entering and leaving station. But what the people do object to is the extravagant manner in which the public money is utilized. I am informed that there are boys on that track who are not able to do a man's work. Yet these semi-men draw a man's pay. Now, who is to blame for this? Why, undoubtedly the trackmaster, Mr. Houle. But Mr. Houle, strange to say, has nothing to do either in the hiring or dismissing of the men. Even the superintendent of the railroad has nothing to say in this political job. The work is managed and controlled by two local men—one a farmer, the other a merchant. The men are hired and paid by those two Grit gentlemen, who never so much as did one day's work on a railroad and who know little or nothing about how much work ought to be done by a laboring man, or the manner in which it ought to be performed. What is the use of Government trackmaster and superintendents if every public work is to be controlled by some pet Grit official of the place. Under the Conservative Government if a man wanted work he had to apply to the trackmaster of the road, and if you were not capable of doing a day's work, "Old Mac" as Mr. McPherson was generally called, would have no hesitancy in telling you to take your shovel and go home. But it is plainly to be seen that the underlying principle of Grit rule is not to economize, but to fatten the purses of their party friends.

To obtain work your application must be made to the Grit merchant of the place, who will not consider whether you are capable of doing a day's work, but will consult his ledger and upon his ledger's verdict depends your safety in getting work. Now, sir, I am not speaking at random. Ask the sixty or seventy men that worked on the North Wilshire curves how they got work? Many of them make no denials, and say my ledger account gave me work. What do works handled in this unbusiness-like way cost? It is not possible to find out just now what the side track at Emerald will cost, but the people can draw their own conclusions when they consider that the building of not quite a mile of railroad at North Wilshire cost the enormous sum of \$35,000. It is a disgrace and a shame to the Government that has been trusted with our affairs to spend a sum on not quite a mile of road; and that same railroad, fostered by Pope, Howland and others, was built from Tignish to Souris on an average cost of \$14,000 per mile. This large expenditure will yield no adequate return, but it will please a constituency and catch a few votes. Therefore, is it any wonder that the public works cost so much, when every dunkey in the country has his hand in the government purse.

Considering that this extravagance is carried on in such a barefaced manner on P. E. Island, to what height does it not swell in the other larger provinces? This scandalous expenditure of public money ought to be seriously taken into consideration by the people. Let both Grits and Conservatives look at the local finances of this Province in the declining days of Grit rule. They cannot fail to see the deplorable condition we are in. Just look at the above mentioned job, and note its expense, and let them remember that it is an honor to a man that would dare be a traitor to his party when his party is a traitor to right.

—It is plain that in all parts of the country the Federal Government has lost a large part of the support that it received three years ago, and expressions of disgust are now seen and heard in quarters where satisfaction, or at least indifference, lately prevailed. The following from the Windsor Review is only one of numberless announcements that have been lately made by the provincial newspapers:—

In Essex County the Government is daily losing its grip, the good people who were inveigled into the belief that the Reform party were sincere in their promises have waited in vain for the fulfilment of those pledges, and instead of reducing the expenditure from \$38,000,000 view with contempt the enormous figure of \$60,000,000 which has been appropriated this session. The honest members of the Reform party, almost to a man, are crying for honest successors to the present representatives, and their faith being broken in the party of corruption and disgrace, are casting their lot with the true old Conservative organization.
