The King's County Election Return.

SATURDAY'S Patriot contains another article on the action of the Returning Officer, for King's County, in making the special return regarding Dr. Robertson's election.

I hereby certify that one of the members elected for the Electoral District of King's County, in pursuance of the within written law as having received the majority of votes lawfully given is Peter Adolphus McIntyre, of Souris, in King's County, Medical Doctor, and I further certify that James Edwin Robertson, of Montague, in King's County, Medical Doctor, a candidate at the election held by virtue of the within written writ, appears by the returns from the several Deputy Returning Officers to have the next highest number of votes given at such election, and it having been represented to me at a meeting up of the votes by certain of the electors of said Electoral District having a right to vote at such elections, as appears by the several papers returned here with and marked respectively with the letter E F G H, and initialed by me that the said James Edwin Robertson, at the time of his nomination as a candidate at such election, and at the time of holding such election, was a member duly elected and returned for the House of Assembly, of the Province of Prince Edward Island for the fourth Electoral District of King's County and by reason thereof qualified to be elected or returned, as a member of the House of Commons, of Canada at said election: I do hereby further certify that Augustine Colin McDonald, of Montague Bridge, in King's County, merchant, a candidate at such election, duly qualified, has the next highest number of votes lawfully given at such election, and I do hereby make this return of and respecting the said James Edwin Robertson and Augustine Colin McDonald for the information of all whom it may concern.

The editor of the Patriot contends that the Returning Officer's duties were only ministerial, and that he was bound to shut his eyes to the legal incapacity under which Dr. Robertson rested, and to the fact that his nomination and election were absolutely "null and void."

With all due respect for the legal knowledge of the editor of the Patriot, we think that the "candidate" referred to in that section most certainly means a legal candidate—a candidate who is qualified by law to become one, and not a person who cannot qualify and whose nomination and election are by law "null and void."

At a German church a new organist had been engaged, who was fond of adding some improvisation to every piece he played. On the first Sunday, after he had finished the 'Gloria,' he wished to add a few bars of his own, but the blower suddenly ceased to play. "Go on," the organist cried angrily; "don't you see I am still playing?" "Playing, indeed," said the blower. "I have been in this business for the last thirty years, and I know just exactly how much wind is required for a 'Gloria.' I don't see why you should have any more than your predecessor."

Mr. MORRIS, of the firm of Morris & Kniple, of London, Eng., dry dock engineer, explained his project on a dry dock at Halifax. He said he would require to have \$32,000 yearly guaranteed before he could undertake the work. A committee of citizens was appointed to consider the proposition.

In the Rolls Court, London, a witness was being cross-examined touching certain discreditable money-lending transactions, when he suddenly stopped short in his answer, and seemed incapable of uttering a word. He turned deadly white, and stood staring with distended eyes out of the window. In vain did Judge and counsel press for a reply to the question which had been put. Not a word could be got out of him, and the poor wretch began to show symptoms of a fainting fit. The Judge's seat commanded a view of the yard. "I don't think this is a case of illness," he said; "the fact is, he has seen an apparition outside the court." The witness was helped out in a dazed state. Outside he was met by a police officer, the apparition referred to, who took him into custody.

From Buffalo, U. S., the news comes that some veterans of the late war, who have not wholly lost their warlike feelings, have notified many artillerymen, infantrymen, and naval officers of the service in this country that a secret organization, for which the name of the "Egyptian Legion" has been selected, will soon be put in working order.

A committee has been appointed and correspondence with some power abroad has been carried on. The preparations so far have been kept very quiet, and those who know about the society seem to be under some obligation of secrecy, for they refuse to say anything about it.

That it has something to do with England's trouble with Egypt seems very apparent, and as many Irishmen are interested in the legion it is fair to presume that a military organization is being made, the services of which will be given to any European power which takes up a fight with England.

Tonnage of the Dominion. The gross tonnage of steam vessels in the Dominion in 1881 was 162,928, as against 158,862 in 1880 and 92,278 in 1873.

Crops in Great Britain. An English exchange says that while the all-around agricultural produce of England will be larger than it has been in three out of the last four years, it is now too late in the season for any imaginable weather to bring a great harvest.

Scottland, where oats to a great extent replace the wheat grown in this country, will be the better off for that reason; though if potato disease become as widely prevalent as people fear it must be, the advantage will be counterbalanced. From Ireland, as during recent seasons, reports are none favorable than those from either England or Scotland; but in this case the unknown quantity of potato disease is of the utmost importance.

The Railway Accident this Morning.

An Axle Breaks and Throws Two Cars Down an Embankment.

No Very Serious Injury.

THE Steamboat Express train, under Conductor McGowan, left this city at the usual time this morning. On board were eight Sisters of the congregation de Notre Dame.

When they had proceeded about a mile beyond Winslow Station, the Superintendent, who was standing on the platform of the rear car, noticed an axle breaking under the fourth car of the train. He instantly pulled the alarm line, had the speed brakes promptly applied, and the speed was materially reduced; but not enough to save the two rear cars, which, owing to the dragging axle, had separated from the train and then tumbled over an embankment about six feet deep, and lay on the side, with wheels up.

Mr. Archibald, Mr. Horace Hazard, and others, who jumped from the train as it capsized, immediately broke open the doors and assisted the passengers out of the cars.

On making inquiries they found that no one was very seriously hurt. The Superintendent immediately attached a battery to the telegraph lines and telegraphed to the city for a relief train.

This was sent under Mr. Unsworth and Conductor McDonald, accompanied by Drs. Beer and Conroy, to the scene of the accident, as quickly as possible. On arrival they found the passengers all—though shaken considerably by the accident—able to move about as usual.

Among the most seriously injured was Mr. John F. Robertson. He received internal injuries, the severity of which cannot yet be determined.

Mrs. John F. Robertson received a heavy scalp wound, was cut over the left eye, and she complains of internal injuries, which cannot be discovered without further examination. Her child escaped unhurt.

Mrs. Ronald Walker was seriously bruised on the side of the head and the muscles of her neck were strained. Her daughter escaped unhurt.

Mr. Riad received severe injuries to his back, and Mr. Archibald, in jumping from the car, sprained his foot.

The Sisters of the Congregation de Notre Dame escaped without severe injury—whilst the exception of Mother St. Eliza, whose left side was seriously bruised. We are pleased to note she is now doing well.

The relief train returned to the city at 10 o'clock, bringing four of the Sisters of Notre Dame, Mothers St. Mary, St. Eliza, St. Philip and St. Eleanor (en route to Montreal), Mr. Archibald, Mrs. Ronald Walker and daughter, and Mr. and Mrs. Robertson and child. The other passengers proceeded to their respective destinations in the Express.

The accident is one which is liable to happen on the very best equipped railways. It is one which cannot be foreseen, and consequently, cannot be avoided. This morning's accident would no doubt have been more serious in its results had the breaking of the axle not been seen on the moment by Mr. Archibald, whose prompt act in giving the alarm saved the lives of at least some of those on board.
