IN CHANCERY.

[L.S.] VICTORIA, by the Grace of God, of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, Queen, Defender of the Faith, &c. &c. To John Henry Gates, of Charlottetown, in Queen's County, in the Province of Prince Edward Island, Esquire, and Edward Jones, of 58 Regency Street, Westminster, London, England, engineer, greeting:

We command you and every of you, that within eight days after the service of this writ on you, inclusive of the day of such service, laying all other matters and excuses aside, you, and each of you, do cause an appearance to be entered for you in our Court of Chancery at Charlottetown, to a bill filed against you by the President, Directors and Company of the Bank of Prince Edward Island (an Insolvent Banking Company) and the Bank of Nova Scotia, Lemuel Cambridge Owen and Charles Colson Gardiner (the Liquidators of such Insolvent Banking Company) and that you do answer concerning such things as shall then and there be alleged against you, and to observe what our said Court shall direct in this behalf upon pain of an attachment issuing against your persons and such other process of contempt as the Court shall award, and of the said bill being taken pro confesso.

Bishop Lynch's Silver Jubilee.

The festivities in connection with Archbishop Lynch's twenty-fifth anniversary of his consecration were fittingly concluded on the 12th inst. by a banquet in the Rossin House tendered by His Grace. There were about 250 present, including the visiting clergy and many prominent citizens of all denominations to do honor to the distinguished host. Seated to the right of His Grace were the Lieut.-Governor, Archbishop Taschereau, of Quebec, Attorney-General Mowat, Archbishop O'Brien, of Halifax, Chief Justice Wilson, Bishop Loughlin, of Brooklyn, N. Y., and to the left Archbishop Ryan, of Philadelphia, Mayor Boswell, Bishop Gossbrind, of Burlington, Vermont, Dalton McCarthy, Q. C., Col. Clarke, the Speaker, and Col. Gilmor, Clerk of the Ontario House of Assembly. After the menu had been discussed the Lieut.-Governor proposed the health of "Our Host, Archbishop Lynch." The toast was drunk with enthusiasm. His Grace briefly replied, thanking the Lieut.-Governor for his complimentary observations and referring generally to his own work during the past 25 years. He concluded by proposing the health of "Our Guests," paying a graceful tribute to the distinguished prelates from the other provinces and States. The toast was replied by the Lieut.-Governor, the senior Bishop of the United States, and others, all of them referring to the auspicious occasion and warmly congratulating His Grace. No other toasts were proposed and the proceedings terminated shortly before midnight. During the evening a letter was read from Sir John Macdonald expressing regret at his inability to be present. Hon. John Costigan represented the Federal Government.

Stanley's Return.

Henry M. Stanley has returned to Berlin from London. The four neutrality proposals will be immediately discussed by the Congo committee. The American neutrality scheme proposes that the powers occupying territory on Congo Basin shall not make war upon each other, nor upon natives. Mr. Stanley assured the committee that England has accepted his proposition to recognize the African International Association, but its formal ratification is anxiously awaited. The American delegates will support Sir Edward Malet's proposition for the total abolition of the slave trade. Eminent journalists are preparing papers on the third part of the programme of the conference, defining rules that shall govern European annexation in Africa.

Questionable Bravery.

The man who drove over the rough pavements of Pittsburg recently with sixty quarts of nitro-glycerine jolting about in his cart, enough, as is noted, "to blow all Pittsburg through the back windows of the Cosmos," is commended by the local press for his bravery, but is requested next time to warn the public so that his less courageous fellow-citizens may have a chance to withdraw to the woods.
