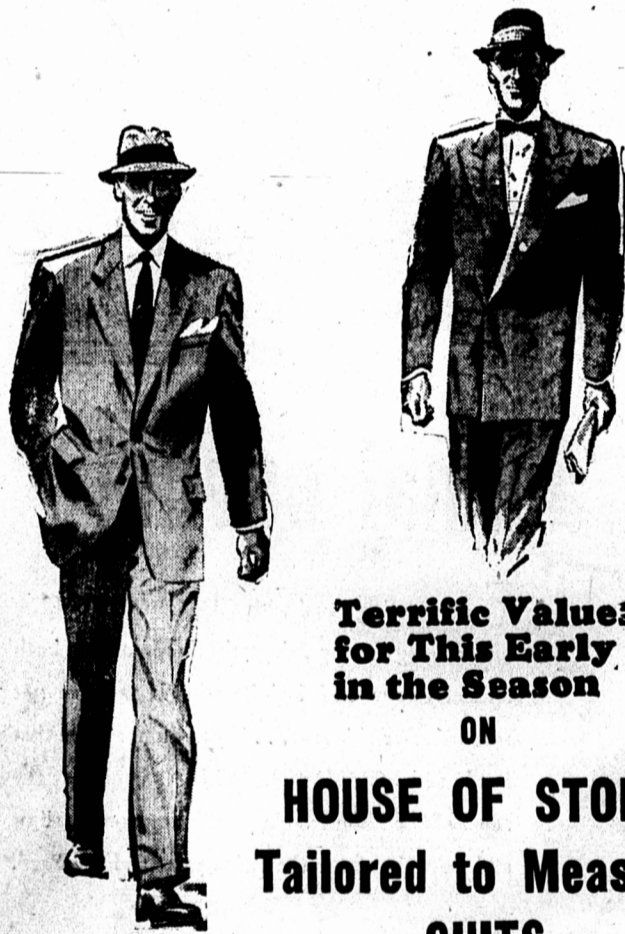
THE DESERT FOX AT THE CAPITOL

There have been many pictures about the last big but few have come to the screen with more fidelity and spine-tingling action than "The Desert Fox," which opens today at the Capitol Theatre.
