### Parliamentary Row Brewing In Britain Over Chastity

LONDON (Reuters)—A storm of righteous moral indignation is raging around the head of Britain's bachelor education minister, Sir Edward Boyle, for failing to repudiate the "modern" views on chastity expressed by his principal medical officer, Dr. Peter Henderson. A parliamentary row is brewing and several members have announced that they intend to force Boyle to state clearly whether he approves of intercourse before marriage as soon as the House of Commons reassembles after its summer vacation.

Dr. Henderson recently told a group of 50 young teachers and lecturers that engaged couples who had intercourse were not necessarily unchaste.

The blast of criticism that resulted from his lecture was so strong that Boyle refused to interview in the controversy, saying he felt it would be wrong for him to try to impose his personal views on schools.

Boyle, 40, describes himself half seriously as "a Puritan" but is determined to avoid imposing any regulations on morals, politics or religion for Britain's 200,000 teachers. "I should not like to see a hint of his personal opinion, he has insisted that it is not his duty as a minister to establish rules on the subject of sex."

### Wheat Occupied Spotlight In Canada During Past Week

Wheat is still the king in Canada and the spotlight has also reigned over the Canadian business scene.  
The Canadian Wheat Board in Winnipeg announced that Russia had made an \$11,300,000-bushtel sale of Canadian wheat worth \$22,000,000 and another—and much bigger—sale was reported in the making with the Iron Curtain country.  
Speculating on the new deal, reported to be in the neighborhood of 20,000,000 bushels worth more than \$50,000,000, was heightened by a wheat board announcement that restrictions have been put on wheat exports.  
Communist countries have done a lot of wheat shopping in Canada this year. Poland and Yugoslavia have purchased a total of 42,700,000 bushels and China—in a three-year deal made in July—has agreed to purchase a minimum of 112,000,000 bushels.  
The automobile industry, the traditionally optimistic segment of the economy, was all dressed up in its best last week.

Roy Scott, president of Ford of Canada, says Canada's booming auto industry can be expected to boom even more in coming years.  
He said motor vehicle manufacturers are "incurable optimists" and predicted 1964 will be "no worse a year than 1963" in breaking records in production and sales.  
A note of cautious optimism on the business outlook for 1964 was sounded during the annual convention of the Canadian Institute of Management in Toronto-Dominion Bank.

### Auto Plants Will Add Zip To Economy

CLEVELAND (AP)—The automobile industry, by scheduling record-breaking fourth-quarter production has taken a strong short term position that will go a long way toward adding zip to the entire economy. Steel Magazine said Saturday, "The move by the leading users of steel expressed their optimism about business the rest of the year, even though 1964 model have not been tested in the market place."

The rate production said steel mills have increased operations for the fourth straight week. An anticipated 1,810,000 tons was turned out last week and the forecast for this week was up two per cent from the previous week, bringing operations to a rate of about 98 per cent of official capacity, Steel said.

### N.Y. Stocks Nudge Into Another High

Selected papers, electronics, steels, motors and drugs did well but there were plenty of losers among recent favorites. Volume during the week averaged 27,797,350 shares from 24,557,722 in the previous four-day trading week shorted by the Labor Day holiday. It was the biggest total since the week ended June 2, 1963, when 40,583,230 shares changed hands.  
The Associated Press average of 60 stocks made a small advance of 4 1/2 points, remaining below its all-time record of 811 reached in the previous week. Standard and Poor's 500-stock index, however, made a new closing record of 73.20, ending the week at 73.17.  
Not a single day had volume of less than 5,000,000 shares and the largest total for a first hour since Oct. 19, 1957, when 2,210,000 shares changed hands. A number of semi-neglected blue chips—like Westinghouse, which rose two points—benefitted from investment buying.  
The star of the week, however, was low priced Studebaker, whose jump of 1/4 to 8 1/8 apparently attracted many buyers from the general public who usually like low-priced speculations.
