A grand reception awaits them, as the gallant conduct of the Canadians has won the admiration of every Englishman. The scenes on the arrival of Colonel Otter and his men will rival and likely surpass those witnessed on the return of the troops up to date.

### At Sydney.

SYDNEY, Nov. 8.—The result of today's election in Cape Breton was a surprise. The Liberals themselves did not expect such a victory. There are strong evidences of much shady work being done in the county. The Liberals are very jubilant over the victory.

### Russia's Reply to Germany.

ST. PETERSBURG, Nov. 8.—The text of the Russian reply to the Anglo-German agreement note is published.

The first point, providing for open ports on the rivers of the Chinese littoral is favorably received, as it does not alter existing treaties. The second point is all the more in harmony with Russia's intentions, as the integrity of the Celestial Empire is the fundamental principle of Russian policy.

As regards the possibility of a violation of this principle, in the third article, Russia refers to her note of May 28, and repeats her declaration that such violation would compel Russia to modify, as circumstances might require, the attitude she has taken up.

### CHINESE ETIQUETTE.

One Cause of the Recent Trouble.

Julian Ralph writes as to the relations of sexes in China, and says: Women of good repute keep indoors—are kept in, if you please. The missionary women roam freely about as they will. Kissing is regarded as as vicious and an unspeakable act, yet our missionary women kiss their husbands and brothers in the streets when they meet after being parted for a time. In China when a bride is about to be carried in her 'flowery' (bridal chair) to the bridegroom's house she has to be borne to the chair by her father. No other male relative has ever touched even her hand for years, not since she was an infant and played with her brother. If she has no father, a brother or an uncle may take the liberty and perform the office of lifting and carrying her away—because it could not be imagined that any girl would leave her home and people of her own free will, even to be married.

When people have such notions and customs what do you suppose they think upon seeing our men and women shaking hands, walking arm-in-arm, helping each other over muddy roads and fondling or handling one another as our husbands and wives are free and right in doing? From what I saw and heard I drew the conclusion that no woman should be sent or should go with our missionaries to China. It is the women who innocently cause a great fraction of the mischief. If any women are permitted to go to China they should only be such as understand Chinese etiquette, customs and prejudices, and mean to defer to them.

### RUSSIA IN CHINA.

A Railway Story Contradicted Officially.

ST. PETERSBURG, Nov. 8.—Prince Khilkoff, Russian minister of railways, authorizes the Associated Press to deny categorically the assertion of a leading German newspaper that Russia is planning to construct a railway from Samarkand to Hankow via the Kashgar Valley, Lake Cukunor and the Wei Ho and Hoang Ho Valleys or any other route. He asserts that the intervening mountains are all but impassible, and that such a line would cost billions of dollars, though it possibly may be built a hundred years from now. "Russia," said Prince Khilkoff, "formerly contemplated a line from Samarkand to Tomsk, but she gave up the project when the Chinese trouble began. The direct branch line from St. Petersburg to the Siberian Railroad has also been abandoned for the present. The only line now in process of construction or planned is a line from Orenburg on the Ural to Taskent in Syr-Darya. There is not much chance of American shops supplying Russia with railway materials in the future. The Russian shops have a capacity of 1,000 locomotives annually, which exceeds the demand of the country. They could build 29,000 cars a year, whereas Russia only ordered 15,000 for 1900."

W. R. Holloway, United States Consul in St. Petersburg, has recently received many enquiries regarding an alleged railway for which America is to supply the capital. Prince Khilkoff says that no such road is contemplated. He thinks it probable that unauthorized agents are appearing in the United States.

### KRUGER WELL

And Hopes the Boers Will Fight On.

LONDON, Nov. 8.—A despatch from Jibutli, in French Africa, says the Dutch warship Gelderland, with ex-President Kruger aboard, has arrived there. The former chief magistrate of the Transvaal is in excellent health, though his eyes are still affected. When the cruise arrived Mr. Kruger was on deck smoking. When told that the Boers were still fighting, he said: "May they fight unceasingly." The Gelderland will remain at Jibutli three days.
