

Writer Sees Week 'Good' For All Kinds Of Animals

Rome police took steps to save a dog from a life of crime. They arrested Luigi Coltarelli and said he went too far when he trained the pooch to steal chickens for his pot.

Firemen puffed up 400 steps to the top of a Frankfurt, Germany cathedral after smoke was seen coming from a tower window. They were met by clouds of flying ants, buzzing happily around the old structure.

Mrs. Florence Hill of Denver, Colo., swallowed a live mouse—not intentionally, she explained hastily. She awoke from a nap and saw a mouse on a sewing machine beside her bed. She opened her mouth to scream, and the mouse popped in.

Crocodiles have entered Malaya's general election. Candidate Inche Hussein bin Noordin plunged into a croc-infested river to test a local superstition that good people will be allowed to swim across it safely. Hussein, either too good or too thin to interest the reptiles, was untouched during his crossing.

On the spiritual side, five Buddhist monks in Formosa prayed for the souls of mosquitoes, mice and other animals that have been sacrificed in the name of science.

The United States Navy decided to supply a husband for Miss Baker, one of the two monkeys that went on a 1,700-mile space trip. Scientists want to find out whether space radiation will result in any "abnormalities in reproduction."

"COLLOSSAL BLUNDER"
The Mid-Canada radar system was described as an abortion, a colossal blunder and a shameful waste of money.

Group Capt. Charles Limbrick, 62, who retired in 1956 as RCAF director of radio warfare, said he opposed construction of Mid-Canada but "the scientists rammed it down our throats."

Defence Minister Peakes said the radar line is an essential part of the North American warning system. It lies along the 55th parallel, between the Distant Early Warning line to the north and the Pine Tree line to the south.

MORE CO-OPERATION
U.S. Defence Secretary Neil McElroy and Defence Minister Peakes met in Ottawa to consider North America's defence. McElroy called for more U.S.-Canadian co-operation in building additional radar stations to fill a hole in the Pine Tree system.

That line now extends from the west coast to Dawson, B.C., and from the east coast to the region of Winnipeg. Defence planners long have been worried about the gap in the Prairie.

Present plans call for seven new long-range radar stations to be built in the area, but McElroy said more are needed. The U.S. probably would pay most of the cost.

CABINET CHANGES
Prime Minister Diefenbaker, returning to Ottawa from a 10-day vacation in Saskatchewan, said there will be one or more cabinet changes soon.

Newspapers have been speculating for some time about the various posts and persons that will be involved, but the prime minister declined to give any hints of the appointments he is considering.

RACE AND EDUCATION
A flag-waving crowd of 200 segregationists marched on Little Rock's Central High School—where U.S. troops battled a mob two years ago—to protest the integration of Negro students into the previously all-white school.

The scene, as local and state police swung billys to break up the demonstration, was similar to the 1957 racial fights, but there was one important difference.

In 1957, local and state forces

were trying to keep Negro students out of the schools. This time, they were trying to keep them in.

UGLY RUMORS
Charges and counter-charges, rumors and denials came in a flood from Cuba. Sorted out from the conflicting reports came a clear picture of a move to overthrow rebel leader Fidel Castro's revolutionary regime.

The move has been crushed, said Castro, whose healthy appearance appeared to refute reports that he had been wounded in an attempted assassination.

Not so, say supporters of deposed dictator Fulgencio Batista, battles still are going on.

Hundreds and even thousands of arrests were reported as Castro's forces battled the uprising.

HASK DIES
A Sabre jet of the RCAF's Golden Hawks acrobatic team, approaching McCall airfield at Calgary for a landing, collided with a private plane killing three persons.

The jet pilot was P. L. Jebb Kerr of Welland Ont.

CANADIAN TUTOR
Lieut. Jean Lajeunesse, 27, of Montreal was selected to tutor Prince Charles during the summer. Reports said it is French-speaking Canadian army officer was selected because the Queen wants her 10-year-old son to be able to speak fluently with French-Canadian intentions, instead of the Parisian French usually taught to the Royal Family.

CURTAIN LOANS
The huge demand for money to finance Canada's expanding economy forced banks to move to limit increasing lending.

After an announcement that the Bank of Canada's interest rate stood at a record 6.51 per cent, the Canadian Bankers' Association said the bank would have to "curtail further expansion in their lending policies."

BUST UP
Is Miss Universe's booming bust a flop?

A Tokyo plastic surgeon said he injected a cupful of a special liquid plastic into the bosom of Akiko Kojima, who measured 37-23-38 when she won the recent Miss Universe contest after being named Miss Japan.

It's not true, cried the statuesque Oriental beauty, her controversial bosom heaving with emotion.

Replied the doctor: It's a very common operation among Japanese women, very simple to do and very effective.

HERE AND THERE
The Queen, expecting her third child early next year, rested at Balmoral Castle in Scotland. She met the Prime Minister Kwame Nkrumah of Ghana, whose country she was to visit, and made him the first Negro member of the Privy Council.

The sceptre of King Tutankhamen, valued at \$3,000,000, has disappeared from the Egyptian museum. A total of 140 guards were replaced after the museum curator discovered 25,000 other priceless items have disappeared or been misplaced.

And in Copenhagen, Danish doctors gave up a campaign to switch children from candy to carrots—not even to save their teeth will the kids stop eating their sweets, the doctors sadly reported.

MARITIMES ELECTIONS
Election campaigns vied for attention with festivals in the Maritimes' week.

A record 95 candidates set out to win voters' support in the Aug. 20 Newfoundland election that Liberal Premier Joseph Smallwood hopes will erase the Progressive Conservative party from the 36-seat legislature.

Liberals have the most candidates—33. Conservatives have 32, the labor-backed Newfoundland Democratic Party 19 and the United Newfoundland Party nine.

The big issue is Newfoundland's Confederation agreements—particularly financial—with Ottawa. Speeches during the week waxed hot and heavy from all sides.

Premier Alex Matheson unveiled some of the main planks

in his platform for Prince Edward Island's Sept. 1 election. Nomination day isn't until Aug. 18. Among other things, the premier promises a franchise reform to give every islander equal voting basis. He also said he would name a committee to make recommendations on the voting system.
