CANADA AND ITS RESOURCES

An Interesting and Instructive Lecture
by Mr. J. Heber Haslam—Pub-
lished by Request.

(Concluded.)
A word or two now about the soil of the country, which may be described as a deep silty deposit, successively for forty years on the same land without any diminution of yield or evidence of soil exhaustion. Crops are grown there year after year without manure, which to farmers unused to such soils is simply miraculous.

At Indian Head, in 1893, I saw thousands of acres of wheat which averaged forty bushels to the acre, the quality superior to such superior that the difference in price would almost pay for taking it there. At Edmonton, in the same year, I saw oats yielding from 30 to 120 bushels per acre, and the wheat crop was equally good. The soil there is equally good for wheat and barley, roots, etc. Potatoes yield there the virgin soil 400 bushels to the acre; all kinds of garden vegetables grow as well here without any manure at all as ever saw them grow anywhere else with the highest manuring. Edmonton is one thousand miles north of Winnipeg, and there is not an intervening acre but is equally good for some agricultural purposes. Where it is not suitable for wheat it is a valuable pasture and hay land, and vice versa.

I could give the testimony of a great many capable and independent authorities, if time permitted, but will content myself with quoting from James J. Hill's evidence, given before a committee of the Dominion House of Commons. There can be no better authority on the matter than Mr. Hill. He is the president of the Great Northern Railroad, and yet with a population three and a half times as great and a debt more than five times as large, her trade is only about one-third greater than that of Hungary. Her manufactures do not amount to as much, and she has less than half as many miles of railway. Italy has a population of nearly six times as much as Canada, and a debt ten times greater, and yet her total trade is less than twice as much. Her manufactures are only 40 per cent. greater, and she has little more than half as many miles of railway.

As the abundance of grasses keep up the soil, and the soil through the summer season, and as hay and other crops are raised, it is possible with the smallest expense to keep up the dairying operations all winter. The butter and cheese of Manitoba are of excellent quality, and the dairying industry bids fair to be one of the most important adjuncts to wheat growing. Sheep, also, do well in any part of the country in which any attention has been paid to sheep husbandry.

Taking the country all in all, and judging not only by the well known capabilities of its soil, but by the surest of all tests—the experience of its people—it can be said safely that, from an agricultural standpoint, there are few countries of like area in the world that are so uniformly well adapted to general farming as the Canadian North-west.

Now, what use have Canadians made of their magnificent country, it may be asked? In reply it may be said that no people in the world are more progressive or have made better use of their opportunities than Canadians.

Now, it must be remembered that the Dominion of Canada as such is only 27 years old, and that her population is but about five millions. Her export trade in 1868 was but \$7 millions, and in 1893 was \$100 millions, or more than double, and her total foreign trade during that year was 247 millions. Her manufactures of different kinds, according to the census of 1891, amounted to the sum of \$75 millions. Canada's national debt is \$240,000,000, and she has 14,870 miles of railway. I am going to make some comparisons with the European countries, and want you to follow these figures closely, as they will reveal to me when I first caught their significance.

Spain is a country with a population of 17 millions, and a national debt of 1,250 millions. She was at one time one of the greatest maritime countries in the world, and it was from her shores and in a Spanish ship that Columbus sailed when he discovered America, and yet with a population three and a half times as great and a debt more than five times as large, her trade is only about one-third greater than that of Hungary. thing that now distinguishes civilization from barbarism, and in this favored land, I am persuaded, it has lost none of its potency. Nor has the blood of the Celt, the strong, sturdy, self-reliant, indomitable Scotchman, been backward wherever there were deeds to do or wrongs to right, or ignorance to dispel, and to the brave generous eloquent witty Irish have been added, under the stimulating air of America, those other qualities which have made him foremost in every good work, and then there are our French fellow citizens and who can deny their good qualities, first in art and refinement and everything that "graces life and softens toil," and I believe that as time goes on, as prejudices are broken down, and a larger charity prevails between the different races, there will be the mingling of their purposes and the crossing of their blood, come forth a people greater than Anglo-Saxon, greater than Celt or Gaul, having the good qualities of each, and in which the faults of all shall be lost.

I look into the future and I see fifty years from now this great country the home of fifty millions of people; her practices purified and the seat of a civilization such as the world has not seen. Homesteads, villages, towns, cities, and with a system of education which will open up every pathway of destination and avenue of preferment to the humblest son or daughter of her soil, her mountains, yielding up to the industry of her people the untold riches which will make her cities the happy homes of teeming millions, the shriek of the locomotive in every valley and on every hillside; her lakes and rivers bearing on their mighty bosoms the riches of half a continent; her ships carrying the product of her soil and workshops to every market. The wealth of the country evenly distributed amongst its people, its homes happy, its people free and untrammelled, its Churches earnest, and all creeds lost in the Gospel of Charity and of Christ, and I am sure, then all the best earth there will not be fairer prospect or a happier people.
