

## To Supervise Claims Payment

As a result of a promotional competition which was open to employees of the National Employment Office in Charlottetown, Mr. W.B. Peters has been appointed a Grade 2 Employment and Claims Officer, and supervisor of the claims payment section.

Mr. Peters joined the staff of the Local Office immediately after the last war as a clerk, and sometime afterwards was upgraded to the position of Clerk Grade 2. Still later he was made an Employment and Claims Officer Grade 1, which rank he held until his most recent promotion.

Since the introduction of the cash pay system for Charlottetown residents, he has been cashier, a position which involves considerable responsibility.

Mr. Peters had lengthy service in the Canadian Army in Italy where he won the Military Medal, and also in North West Europe. He was discharged with the rank of Sergeant, and has since continued his connection with the Canadian Army Militia. At the present time he holds the rank of Captain and Adjutant of the P.E.I. Regiment.

## THRIVING INDUSTRY HAD HUMBLE BEGINNING

"Industry is where you make it," according to two Halifax women who three years ago started making Nova Scotia tartans in their basement. Today they have a thriving business which employs a staff of 45 with an additional 30 women working privately in their homes.

Mrs. Douglas Murray designed the Nova Scotia tartan on a blue background. Since it has been offered for sale commercially it

has been very much sought after by tourists in the province and they have many outlets in other parts of Canada and the United States.

Associated with Mrs. Murray in this thriving enterprise is Mrs. Alex MacAulay also of Halifax. They specialize in ties, tartans, scarves and many children's items of wearing apparel. All are hand woven. They also make blankets.

Attending the APEC meeting here, both women are strong supporters of home made products. Mrs. MacAulay said she went to seven different grocery stores recently so that she might purchase a Maritime brand of pickles. She suggested that APEC should have a woman on the executive who would act as a liaison between the Council and the housewife who, she claimed, spent most of the family income in any case.

## Dalhousie President Raps Loosening Of Liquor Law

Strong exception to APEC's endorsement of any relaxation in the liquor laws of the Maritimes was voiced yesterday by Dalhousie University's President, Dr. A.E. Kerr, when a motion to this effect was introduced by Homer Zwicker of Lunenburg.

Dr. Kerr said, "what we are proposing to do here is the very thing which the Premier of France has said precipitated a national crisis in his country." "Any increase in the liberalization of the liquor law is not good for our young people and we shall lose the fine wholesome spirit for which the Maritimes has become famous," he continued.

**CERTAIN SEGMENT**  
Dr. Kerr in making reference to a survey made of the tourist industry in Nova Scotia noted that the requests for greater relaxation of the liquor laws came from a certain segment of the population who, he said, were bound to increase their revenue

therefrom. "Have you asked any of the church groups what they thought of this question?" he inquired, "surely there are things more important than increasing hotel profits. We have our young people to think of and if we have to induce tourist trade by greater sale of alcoholic liquors we will be doing our people irreparable harm."

At the close of Dr. Kerr's remarks, Mr. Zwicker said he would withdraw his motion.

### AGREED WITH KERR

W. Ganong of St. Stephen said he agreed heartily with Dr. Kerr. He felt APEC should not go on record as favouring any such move.

J. Lincoln Dewar of Charlottetown pointed out that the report of the survey should be left as such. He said it represented the views of the people contacted and should not necessarily be taken as endorsement of APEC as a

body. "It is a matter of conscience and I believe that is outside our field," said Mr. Dewar. The Nova Scotia Tourist report submitted by Eric Balcolm pointed out the inadequacy of proper accommodation, the lack of proper transportation facilities at Pictou and Wood Islands and the want of proper entertainment for tourists.

## Authorities Go After Unsanitary Eating Places

City authorities yesterday closed one of the local restaurants for what was termed "failure to comply with the minimum standards required for eating establishments."

Dr. Wendell MacDonald, City Health Officer, stated that all restaurants were inspected periodically by members of the Sanitary Engineering Division of the Department of Public Health, "to carry out a bacteria count on all utensils such as knives, forks, mixers, ice cream scoops, plates, cups, glasses, etc."

In addition eating places are checked for refrigeration dish-washing technique, food storage, wash room facilities, personal cleanliness of food handlers, garbage disposal, fly and rodent control, and general sanitation throughout the premises.

Following each visit to an eating establishment the inspectors issue reports which are handed to the proper city authority. If necessary, certain recommendations are added to these reports.

Copies of each report are given to the proprietors of each restaurant concerned, the city official added.

In this case the proprietors had failed to heed the advice of the inspectors, and as a consequence were ordered to close, he said. Asked if the restaurant would be allowed to re-open the City Health officer stated that permission to re-open would be contingent on complete cooperation with the recommendations of the Sanitary Engineering Division.

Dr. MacDonald intimated that health authorities intended to deal stringently with any further serious infringements of the city regulations regarding public eating places.
