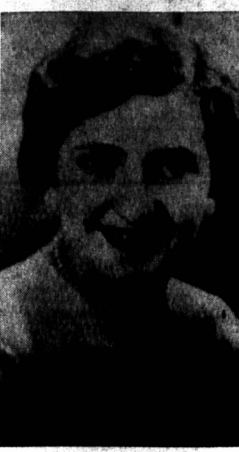

Price Index Down In Seven Cities

OTTAWA (CP)—Influenced mainly by lower food prices, seven of 10 regional consumer price indexes declined during April, the bureau of statistics reported Wednesday. Decreases ranged from 0.9 per cent in Vancouver to 0.1 per cent in Halifax, Saint John and Montreal. The index was unchanged in Ottawa and increased 0.7 and 0.4 per cent in St. John's, Nfld., and Toronto respectively. Food indexes were lower in all but Toronto and St. John's. Index figures at May 1 with April 1 figures in brackets: St. John's 106.6 (105.9); Halifax 114.7 (114.8); Saint John 117.5 (117.6); Montreal 116.6 (114.7); Ottawa 177 (177.7); Toronto 119.1 (118.7); Winnipeg 116.1 (116.5); Saskatoon - Regina 114.6 (114.9); Edmonton - Calgary 114.3 (114.6); Vancouver 117.7 (118.6). The indexes are based on 1949 prices equalling 100 except that for St. John's which uses June, 1951 as the base.

Dutch Elections Held Wednesday

AMSTERDAM (CP)—The Dutch Labor party ran ahead of the Catholic Peoples party and both gained seats in Wednesday's parliament elections, returns early today showed. The seats were lost by Communist and right-wing parties. The outcome was seen as an endorsement by the electorate of the coalition government policy of the last four years. The increased Labor vote was conceded by his political opponents as a personal victory for Socialist premier Willem Drees, who will be 70 next month. A strong champion of social security, he is expected to continue in the post, with a Catholic as deputy premier. Labor's gain of four seats, giving it 34 in the 100-member house, was considered a surprisingly big win under the Dutch system of proportional representation. The Catholics now have 32 seats, a gain of three over the outgoing Parliament. The two parties were the main groups in the outgoing coalition cabinet. Mersey Paper Co. Accepts Offer

NEW YORK (AP)—Bowater Corp. of North America Tuesday announced that its offer to buy the assets of Mersey Paper Co., Ltd., of Liverpool, N.S., has been accepted by Mersey directors. Bowater said if the purchase is finally approved by Mersey stockholders, it plans to build a ground-wood pulp mill with an annual

capacity of 100,000 tons at the site of the present Mersey plant. Mersey now is operating two newsprint machines with an annual output of some 140,000 tons, most of which is sold under long-term contracts to publishers in the United States. Terms of Bowater's offer to Mersey stockholders were not disclosed. The stockholders' meeting to vote on the purchase is scheduled June 22.
