Kings County plowmen will begin their competition to declare a winner who will compete on Thursday with other county champions for the Island crown. The winner to go on to the Dominion championships.

To add to the enjoyment of spectators and participants, even the weather man expects to cooperate with sunny, crisp fall weather forecast.

Although the plowing matches

are the local point of interest, the agricultural fair with its numerous classes draws a large number of spectators. Each year these classes are being added to, and the advent of electricity this year, more people than ever will be able to enjoy the many displays through out the buildings.

The efforts of the president, Mr. Leslie Hunter, and his committees show the keenness and enthusiasm of the farm owners of Kings County as well as the progress and improvement they are making in their farming methods. Many of the former champions will undoubtedly be on hand, along with the newcomers, one of which

could prove to be a dark horse offering keener and better competition than ever before.

The plowing match will start at 10 a.m. with the following events being run: gang plow senior; single furrow novice; single furrow boys under sixteen; two and three sod tractor; tractor boys and girls under sixteen. Also being judged today are the horse classes div. 1; Ayrshires; Holsteins; Jerseys; Guernseys; sheep and swine. Also handicrafts, domestic science etc.

This will be followed by a well packed evening of entertainment, including dancing for both young and old.
