## British MPs Gobble Over Par, Authority

LONDON (Reuters) — Members of Parliament are grumbling again over low pay, lack of real legislative power and procedures that should have gone out with Queen Victoria.

One member recently described tedious, time-consuming parliamentary procedures as "like riding a penny-farthing bicycle in the past age."

A dozen members of the opposition Labor party recently gave notice of a motion calling for action on House of Commons reforms already recommended by various committees.

Chiding the Conservative government for foot-dragging, the motion urged changes to "reverse the decay of the House of Commons as a modern legislature."

The Labor move followed publication of a Conservative pamphlet change or decay, which warned the House of Commons "lost its place as the forum of the nation."

## LOCH MONSTER MAY BE FISH

GLASGOW (Reuters)—Naturalist Peter Scott said Sunday Scotland's Loch Ness "monster" may be a big fish.

Scott, appearing on a television "documentary" about the oft-sighted "monster," said yet "I don't think it could be a mammal because it would have to breathe too often and it would be seen much more frequently."

## Indian Home Minister May Succeed Nehru

NEW DELHI (AP) — Home Minister Lal Bahadur Shastri is five feet tall, mild-mannered and public-spirited — a man who hides his light under a bushel. "Very much like his father," he is the son of the Prime Minister, Nehru.

Shastri appears to have recovered completely from last year's serious illness. But he is 78 and speculation about who will succeed him never stops.

Shastri is seen as a likely opponent of Nehru's Congress party — the only one among half-a-dozen parties that has the strength to form a government.

Nehru always has balanced the wing against the other. He has a private secretary, Mrs. George Schock, in Toronto, N.J., Feb. 21. Mrs. Schock was the former J.W. Jardine, daughter of Mrs. James Jardine and the late Dr. F.A. Jardine of Kensington.

For MPs without private sources of income, life can be a bitter struggle.

Conservative Sir Gerald Nabarro complained that after paying his 1961 expenses he was £202 down on the deal.

"This deficit is the sum I pay my constituents every year for the privilege of representing them," he said.
