ELECTIONS IN THE STATES.

BUTLER DEFEATED

BOSTON, Nov. 7. The elections in the several States passed off very quietly. In Massachusetts, particularly in this city, the excitement was intense; but no disorders are reported.

Butler has carried some of the manufacturing cities; but by reduced majorities. Butler has been defeated by ten thousand majority.

A heavy vote was polled. The vote exceeded, by thirty thousand, that of last year.

The Republicans also elect a large majority of the Legislature and Council. In Boston Butler had a majority of 6,211 over Robinson. Some Republican papers claim that Robinson's majority will be 28,000.

It is rumored that Butler will offer his residence in Lowell for sale, and that he has declared his intention of leaving the State.

Virginia has gone Democratic by a heavy majority. New Jersey remains as of old. New York goes Democratic.

Pennsylvania is again in the Republican field. Maryland, the indications are Democratic. Mississippi has gone Democratic by a heavy majority. Nebraska and Kansas are reported as Republican.
