**AGRICULTURAL NEWS**  
P.E.I. Department of Agriculture

**DAIRYING**  
During the first seven months of this year, from January 1 to the end of July, the production of butter in Canada amounted to 167,851,000 pounds. For the same period in 1956 the production was 181,397,000 pounds. This shows a decrease of 13,546,000 pounds or about 7 per cent. The provinces contributing to this decrease are Nova Scotia, New Brunswick, Quebec, Ontario, Manitoba and British Columbia. Alberta and Saskatchewan registered an increased production during the above period. In Prince Edward Island from January 1 to the end of July there were 3,110,000 pounds of butter manufactured compared with 3,117,000 pounds for the same period in 1956. This is a decrease of only 7,000 pounds or .2 per cent.

The manufacture of cheese in Canada from January 1 to the end of July in 1957 amounted to 52,567,000 pounds compared with 44,499,000 pounds for the same period in 1956. This is an increase of 8,068,000 pounds or approximately 18 per cent. The total stocks of butter held in Canadian storages on July 1, 1957, amounted to 59,156,000 pounds compared with 88,697,000 pounds at the same time in 1956. This is a decrease of 29,541,000 pounds. The total stock of butter held in the Maritimes on July 1, 1957, amounted to 1,177,000 pounds compared with 2,044,000 pounds at the same time in 1956. This is a decrease of 867,000 pounds below last year.

The stock of cheddar cheese held in Canadian storages on July 1, 1957 amounted to 40,672,000 pounds compared with 31,297,000 pounds in 1956. This is an increase of 9,375,000 pounds. Due to the decrease in the production of butter across Canada this year and to the greatly decreased stock pile in storages the price of butter is at the present time advancing rapidly. We have been reliably informed that the out-of-storage price of Government held butter beginning September 1 will be 63 cents per pound F.O.B. Ontario and Quebec storages. Butter is now being quoted wholesale in prints in Nova Scotia at 66 cents per pound delivered with local jobbing at 68 cents a pound. The same prices prevail the week also in the Provinces of New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island.

**CHEESE GRADE**  
The sediment test performed by the laboratory at Ottawa on all samples of cheese graded playing an important part in the grade and price of this commodity this year. According to an Order-in-Council issued on the 21st day of March, 1957, amending the Canadian Dairy Products Regulations all cheese manufactured on and after July 1, 1957, showing an extraneous matter disk No. 3 will be lowered to Canada Second Grade and further all cheese on grading found equivalent to Canada First Grade but showing an extraneous matter disk No. 4 will be lowered to Canada Third Grade.

Therefore cheese which in 1956 was considered First Grade or even bonus cheese if it does not pass this sediment test in Ottawa will be marked down to Second or Third Grade according to the percentage of sediment found in the samples tested. Cheese which is now passed as First Grade in Ontario, both from a grade standpoint and from a sediment standpoint is sold for 34 cents per pound f.o.b. the factory. Even though it may have passed the grade requirements but are set down to Second Grade because of sediment there is a difference in price of from 3/4 to 4 cents per pound.

It would appear therefore that First Grade cheese passing all tests will have an advantage of approximately 4 cents per pound over cheese that does not pass this sediment test.

**MORE POISONOUS WEED**  
One of the worst weeds appearing at this time of year in pastures is Tansy Ragwort, also known as a common name of Stinking Willie, staggerwort and common ragwort. This weed is a biennial or short-lived per-

**Inman Picnic Held At Crapaud**

The Inmans' and their descendants from all parts of the Province, Hamilton, Ontario and Detroit, Michigan, as well as visitors from Elyria, Ohio, Dorchester, Quincy and Haverhill, Massachusetts, assembled on Saturday afternoon, August 10th at the Anglican Youth Centre, Crapaud to celebrate the 138th anniversary of the landing of their ancestors at Hampton beach. A ring of sadness was mingled with joy to within the year three members of the clan Major T.H. E. Inman, his daughter, Mrs. Reginald Hockin, both of Summerside and George McDonald, Crapaud, were called to the Great Beyond. A two minute silence was observed in their memory.

The President, A.D. Inman in his opening address briefly traced the history of the clan who came to the Province from York, England, in 1819, with their five sons and one daughter. One of these sons was his grandfather and the shore farm owned by him and known as "Birchwood" at Hampton is now in his possession. After a few more brief remarks he extended a hearty welcome to all present.

Senator Elsie Inman, Montague, being called upon, gave a splendid address in which she stated that members of the Clan are to be found in various parts of the world, mentioning in particular those whom her son Cdr. W.R. Inman met when in England during the last war. They were all people of wealth, culture and industry. Among these were the Inman line of Steamship, Inman motors and many others, some of whom her late husband Judge G.S. Inman knew personally.

**EDUCATION**  
Mrs. Inman made particular mention of those of the name who made a fine contribution to Canada in the field of education and medicine, among whom are Dr. Mark K. Inman, Professor of Economics at London University, London, Ontario and his daughter Miss Faye Ruth Inman M.D., also of London. She also mentioned names of streets and Avenues in Canada and United States named after this distinguished clan. In conclusion, she expressed regret that her son Dr. George Inman was not able to attend on account of official duties that day.

**EARLY DAYS**  
The next speaker was John T. Inman, St. Catherine's, the oldest member of the Clan (83) who compared present day methods of farming with those of his boyhood days when potatoes were planted by hand in sod land every second row with a wooden-beam plow drawn by horses and grain threshed by hand by means of a flail on barn floors. In a more humorous manner he gave advice to single and married folk, advising them to love one another and read the Bible daily and he guided by it. He concluded by saying he hoped to be spared to attend the 1958 gathering.

Mrs. Harold Franch, Detroit, Michigan, also spoke briefly stating this was her first visit to Prince Edward Island and to a family re-union of this kind and she was thrilled with it all. During the afternoon all present registered with Mrs. Lloyd Webster and T.J. Inman, following which a friendship circle was formed and a sing-song of old favorites conducted by Mrs. Charles Martin, Haverhill, Mass., was entered into with delight. The children's races were led by T.J. Inman and prizes awarded by Frank Jardine. This was followed by a candy throw for all the children.

An interesting feature of the picnic was the pictures on display of the old Inman homestead at Hampton shore and some of the pioneer ancestors. The family chart which is not now

large enough to contain all the names of the seven generations is being put into book form by the committee in charge. A bountiful supper was served in the spacious dining hall.
