**Aluminium Clock Hands.**  
"One of the finest and lightest materials that are now largely used for making clock hands is aluminium," said a leading clock manufacturer recently. "Until recently the pointers of big clocks, when not made of wood, were composed of two thin strips of copper, which were capped or hollowed and then brought together, edge to edge, with the rounded sides out, thus giving strength as well as lightness. The aluminium clock pointers are made just in the same way—as the copper ones, but they possess the merit of being twice as light and are far easier to balance.

"It isn't unusual on large clocks to see projecting from the base of the long pointer and in line with it a rod with a ball at the end, this rod being perhaps a third as long as the big pointer. This rod and ball act as a counterweight for the big pointer, which, without a counterweight, would in its movement around the dial bear unevenly upon the arbor or shaft which carries it. On great clocks and often on big timepieces indoors this counterpoise is placed inside the dial out of sight on the arbor.

"The heavier the pointer the greater the weight required in the counterpoise; the greater the weight the more friction on the arbor, and the more friction the greater the power required to drive the clock. By the use of aluminium pointers these drawbacks are reduced to a minimum."—Washington Star.

**Local and Other Items.**

**MYSTERIOUS DISAPPEARANCE.**—The Moncton Times reports that Mrs. William Smith, of Amherst Shore, has disappeared and no trace of her can be found. She has not been right in her mind for some time and it is feared she has drowned herself. Mrs. Smith is about 50 years of age, and was a Miss Collins, of Prince Edward Island. She leaves a husband and six children.

**DAWSON CITY CENSUS.**—According to late advices from Dawson City, the census just completed by the Mounted Police, shows the town to have but 4,445 persons in it. Of this number 3,205 are from the United States, 845 from England and Canada. Of the population 3,659 are male and 786 female. Included in the total are 163 children under the age of 14 years. During the period of one month, from August 26 to Sept. 26, according to notes kept by the police, 1,736 people left Dawson for Cape Nome and outside, and within the same time 1,358 people arrived.

**A DRIVING TOUR.**—Mr. Jacob Vanbuskirk returned on Saturday from Prince Edward Island, where he had spent something over two months in a driving tour, visiting his many friends and calling at most points of interest. The Island is Mr. Vanbuskirk's native province, and he has visited it a good many times since removing to New Brunswick, but he says he never saw such abundant crops as he saw this year. Grain and hay were especially abundant, but the potato crop is also large and of good quality. The big storm beat the grain in some places and where ripe enough shelled it badly, one farmer estimating his loss in this way at one hundred bushels of wheat alone. The crop is so enormous, however, that the loss in this way is scarcely felt. —Moncton Times.

**TROUBLE OVER HIS WIFE.**—A funny thing happened to a New Jersey man the other evening, who went out to hunt up his better half. Mrs. Jane Oliver, of Hoboken, went to the meeting of a patriotic order of which she was a member one evening, and as she did not return at midnight Mr. Oliver set forth in search of her.
