Howlett of O'Leary presiding and conducting opening worship. The clerk Mrs. Earl Jelly and the assistant clerk Mr. Earl Jelly read the minutes of last annual meetings. Reports were received from all the various societies of the Church and showed that the past year was a most successful one from every standpoint, both materially and spiritually. Givings and collections were increased and the Church is in a very healthy state.

The Treasurer Mrs. Watson Silliker of O'Leary presented her report which showed that all bills were paid and there was a balance of \$419.11. The B. Y. P. U. of Knutsford report was presented by Miss Lorraine MacNeill. They presented a very successful program and purchased Youth Hymnals for the Church and sponsored the White Gift Pageant which amount \$255.23 was sent away for the Baptist Advance Program, including that fine amount sent away the total receipts were \$332, and

after expenditures, there is a balance of \$108.82. The report of the Springfield B.Y.P.U. was given by the Minister Rev. C.O. Howlett. 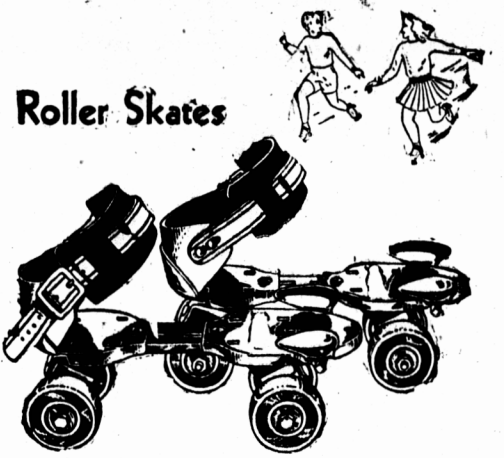
