Local and Other Items.

MORE TAXES.—The Summerside Council has passed a by-law imposing a license fee or tax of \$15 on meat dealers and \$8 on peddlars of roots and vegetables.

WHEN THEY MAY SIT.—The following notice is posted in a pleasure boat belonging to a steamship company on the Stur, Iceland: "The chairs in the cabin are for the ladies. Gentlemen are requested not to make use of them till the ladies are seated."

THE ROPED ARENA.—Tommy Ryan, of Syracuse, and Tommy West, of New York, met in the latter city on Monday night, to battle for the welter weight championship of the world. The bout was to be for twenty rounds. Ryan had the best of the encounter all through and was given the decision in the fourteenth round.

TWO WOMEN SHOT.—Last Saturday evening, at Montreal, Elzear Mann, who was jealous of his wife, pulled a revolver and attempted to shoot her, but her mother, Madame Desjardins, jumped between and received the bullet in her head, dying instantly. Mann also shot his wife, but she may recover.

AN OTHER IMPOSTER.—A stranger disguised as a priest recently visited Rochester, N. H., and swindled a number of merchants out of amounts aggregating several hundred dollars. The man gave his name as Father Conlan, of Manchester. His method was to enter a store and contract for the delivery of goods to be sent to St. John's Church, Manchester. To nearly all the dealers he presented checks for an amount considerably larger than the price of the goods and received the change. The man has disappeared and the police are making search for him, all the merchants involved having discovered that the checks were worthless.

FOUR GUNS ON BRITISH SHIPS.—Rear Admiral Lord Charles Beresford has issued an appeal to the press for an increase of the navy. He says:—"The war between the United States and Spain has taught us a useful lesson. It has taught us the absolute necessity of complete and thorough organization previous to war instead of trusting to chance. It has taught us the value of a proper supply of cruisers and the ineffectiveness of obsolete guns against the range and accuracy of modern guns. No other nation has a ship on effective list armed with muzzle loading guns; whereas England has 45. A nation that sent men to fight on blue water or relied for harbor protection on such weapons would certainly get short shrift."

An English Diplomatist.
Sir Claude Macdonald, the British minister to China, is 46 years old and holds rank in the army as a major. He served with the Seventy-fourth highlanders and was in the Egyptian campaign of 1882 and the Suakim expedition before he was appointed consul general at Zanzibar in 1887. After leaving east Africa he was sent to the Niger, where he proved a very successful consul general in the Niger Coast Protectorate, as the district, which was once known as the "Oil Rivers Protectorate," is now designated. Sir Claude's career in west Africa was cut short in 1896 by his selection for the embassy at Peking.
