Maritime Regional Laboratory Opened

A vast amount of research on products of the sea, such as seaweed and sea algae, will be one of the major projects of the new Maritime Regional Laboratory which was opened in Halifax this week. Attending the official opening as well as a special convocation at Dalhousie were Mr. E.C. Parent, Superintendent of the Dominion Experimental Farm, and Dr. Frank MacKinnon Principal of Prince of Wales College.

The purpose of the convocation was to confer a degree of Doctor of Laws on Dr. E.W.R. Steacie, President of the National Research Council of Canada, by Dr. A.E. Kerr, president of Dalhousie University.

Following the formal opening of the Laboratory by Hon. J.A.D. McCurdy, Lieutenant Governor of Nova Scotia, the members present sat in on a symposium dealing with scientific research in the Maritime Provinces. The Laboratory will be directed by Dr. E. Gordon Young.

During the conducting of the symposium Dr. Ceacle acted as chairman. Among the principal speakers heard were Dr. J.H.L. Johnstone, Dalhousie University; Dr. C.W. Argue, University of New Brunswick; Dr. S.A. Beatty, Mr. S.A. Hilton, Dr. J.E. Keyston and Dr. H.D. Smith, National Research Council.

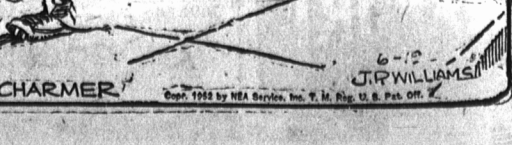

In contrast, he found that Canadians got far better treatment at the hands of the Germans—except those who hit the concentration camps—and recommended that no general compensation be awarded to prisoners in Germany unless they can prove actual maltreatment. To stretch the war claim funds, the Chief Justice recommended: 1. That only claims by Canadians be entertained. 2. Commissioners be appointed to hear claims across the country, fixing a six-month limit for filing of all

Tanker With Iranian Oil Seized At Aden

ADEN, June 18—(Reuters)—The Anglo-Iranian Oil Company's dispute with Iran came to a head today when a British court slapped an injunction on the cargo of an Italian tanker. The 640-ton Rose Mary and its cargo of 1,000 tons of Iranian crude oil will have to remain at this British crown colony until the Supreme Court here decides who the oil belongs to—the Anglo-Iranian Oil Company or Iran.

The cargo is the first to be exported by Iran since the Government of Premier Mohammed Mossadegh ousted the British-owned company and nationalized Iranian oil last year.

The injunction was given to the Rose Mary's skipper, Giuseppe Jafrate, a few hours after the ship had battered her way into port through rough seas.

The ship, flying the flag of Honduras but owned by the Telesita Company of Italy, arrived here last night.
