PROVINCIAL LEGISLATURE.

LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL.

Monday, April 26.

Hon. Mr. McDonald said that if they want a pure Parliament they must exclude officeholders from it. He would not care how stringent the bill was in that respect.

Hon. Mr. Balderston would be willing to support the bill as far as it would go to exclude those who were receiving any salary, or fee or reward from the local Government from the Legislature, but he did not see how receiving a salary from the Dominion Government would affect the independence of a man's vote in the Local Legislature.

Hon. Mr. Balderston said that without the amendment the ground would be rendered comparatively valueless for the purposes intended, and he particularly pointed out that if it was not willing to grant the land to the citizens for a Park.

Hon. Mr. Balderston would support the amendment. He did not think Sir Robert Cass was inclined to become a farmer, and 33 acres of land was quite sufficient for all the purposes he required, and it would be much better to run the land off by straight lines, and not in the zig-zag manner proposed by the bill. He would therefore support the amendment.

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TUESDAY, APRIL 27.

A bill to invest a certain portion of Government House land in the town of Charlottetown for purposes therein mentioned, was read a second time and referred to committee.

Hon. Mr. Dodd remarked that the citizens had been long looking for a portion of that farm for a public park, and if they did not get the portion they required now they would have to wait for the present or any future Governor of the Province, but he thought there was quite enough ground for him for a garden, pasture, &c., after giving up the portion of the farm which he had in mind.

Hon. Mr. Dodd had heard such a report, but from the best information he could obtain it was not the case. There was no reference made to Ordinance property in the correspondence on the table respecting that farm.

Hon. Mr. Strong was aware that Ordinance property was not mentioned in the correspondence, and it was intended to be reserved. It should have been pointed out that the field in question was part of the farm, and unless it was reserved when the farm was handed over, it was now the property of the General Government when Confederation was established for Ordinance purposes, and no notice had been taken of it, he took it as settled question that they could legislate upon it.

How to make Lemonade.—Plain home-made lemonade can be made very cheaply, when lemons are not too dear. The great secret is to use boiling water, and to pour it on the pulp, say, three lemons, with a small piece of peel, but not too much, as it will render the lemonade bitter. Add white sugar to the cooled infusion for sweetener than the others. Let it get cold, and then strain it. Care should be taken that all the pips are removed from the pulp before the boiling water is added.
