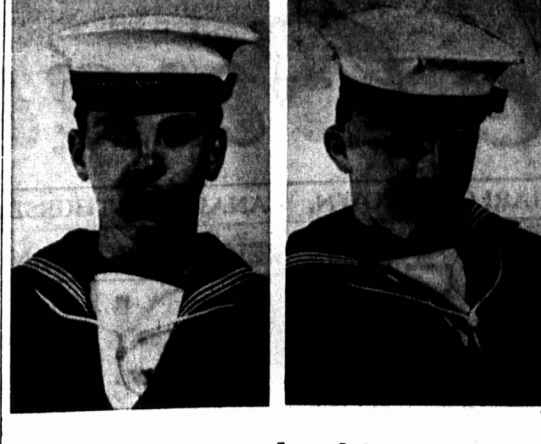

Ayles' Trial Gets Underway

SAINT JOHN, N.B. (CP) — A stiff cross-examination of the crown's star witness by defence counsel Edward C. Atkinson featured proceedings Wednesday at the trial of Clifford Ayles, 25, charged with murdering Allison Graves in a payroll robbery last October.

Mr. Atkinson referred repeatedly to statements made by Harold W. Cunningham, 65, Wednesday and previously at the inquest and preliminary hearing. The business manager of the Saint John Tuberculosis Hospital identified Ayles as the assailant, and much of the questioning concerned the robber's identity.

In several instances Mr. Cunningham claimed he had been recorded incorrectly by court stenographers. It was the third time for him to describe events of Oct. 20, when a man forced Graves to drive to a lonely road in Simonds parish. The hospital chauffeur was stabbed to death, Cunningham suffered a bullet wound, and cash and bonds amounting to \$11,150 were stolen.

Ayles was arrested at Phoenix, Ariz., in December.

Ten witnesses testified Wednesday after selection of the petit jury was completed.

Tito Home In Triumph

BELGRADE (AP) — President Tito came home in triumph from his Moscow trip Wednesday. His government immediately announced he plans a conference with Egyptian President Gamal Abdel Nasser and Indian Prime Minister Nehru next month.

Tito reached the frontier railroad station of Kikinda after 25 days in Russia and Romania. He told 60,000 cheering Yugoslavs Russia is "ready to struggle for peace together with all progressive people."

What had happened in the past was now forgotten and the people of the Communist countries he visited "were very happy we had come," Tito said.

Yogopress, semi-official news agency, said the Tito-Nasser-Nehru meeting would be at Brioni, Tito's summer-resort island in the Adriatic.
