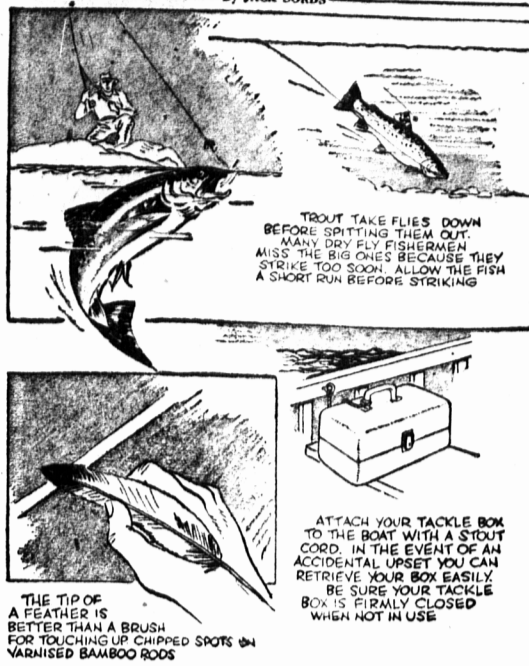

Opinion Is That Tonight's Game Will Be The Final

MONTREAL (CP) — Montreal Canadiens and Detroit Red Wings arrive Monday night for what most persons think will be the last game of the 1956 Stanley Cup finals. Montreal Canadiens are expected to sail away the pewter tonight at the forum for their first Stanley Cup trophy since 1953 and their seventh in all. Their 3-0 victory Sunday night at Detroit gave them a 3-1 lead in the best-of-seven series and the opportunity to end it. Only reported injury for the Canadiens in the hard-hitting game, which ended in the third period, was a swollen thumb suffered by Henri (Pocket Rocket) Richard, Ullman in the first period. He kept on playing. Bernie (Boom Boom) Geoffrion's right knee appeared to come out of a match in good shape, although it had been feared he might have to miss the fourth game. Detroit, which will have to produce to stay alive, suffered a setback early Sunday night when forward Metro Prystai left the ice and the series after being accidentally injured in the eye from Montreal deenceman Tom Johnson's stick. The Wings, whose third-period performance indicated a pretty leg-weary crowd, already have a long list of walking wounded. The victory was a big one in more ways than one. Besides giving Canadiens their lead and a split on Detroit ice games, it marked the first time in 12 Stanley Cup playoff games between the two clubs that the home team has lost. Detroit lost in 1954 at home, but took that series and last year's. A win tonight will probably quicken planning for a mass parade to honor the Canadiens. It was laid on, win or lose, two weeks ago, with preparations under way for a three-hour-long downtown parade and a civic banquet for the team.

Beavers Decide Against Making Formal Protest

SAINT JOHN, N.B. (CP)—Hartley Campbell, manager of Saint John Beavers, said Monday night that "in view of the present situation" a formal protest over a Chatham, Ont., Maroon player would not be made. He had previously wired George Dudley, secretary-treasurer of the Canadian Amateur Hockey Association, a protest against use by Maroons of Lou Bendo in the second game of the Allan Cup semi-final at Chatham. "It is difficult to envision exactly what is taking place in such incidents when neither Beavers nor the referees of the game in question are given official notification of replacements or additions to the opposition team," Campbell said. "Actually that is the second time during this season's playoffs that the Maroons have been given more players. They got extra players for the series fall - Ontario final against Sudbury Wolves, and now they get two more. Why don't they just get together a new team?"
