Curling Club Burglar Nabbed In Wild Chase

The Charlottetown Curling Club was the scene of a daring robbery yesterday morning that ended in a wild chase through backyards and fences. One man was apprehended as the result of quick work on the part of two Charlottetown policemen, one of whom carried out his duties while badly injured.

Out in the police patrol when the burglar alarm at the Police Station indicated trouble at the Curling Club the two officers, Constables Matt Acorn and Alfred (Aps) Arsenault, drove immediately to the Euston Street rink and entered the club. Barely distinguishing the figure of a man behind the canteen enclosure the police told him he was trapped and to come out. Instead he made a sudden break from rear and dove headfirst through a side door on Orlebar Street, smashing through the glass. As the officers went after him a large area of the heavy glass still in the door frame came crashing down on the right hand of Constable Arsenault inflicting deep cuts across all fingers that required 17 stitches to close.

However, the two policemen stayed close enough to follow the suspect with Cst. Acorn punctuating the chase with a warning shot from his revolver. At the sound the fleeing man fell to the ground but rose immediately and resumed his flight.

The accused elected trial by magistrate and entered a plea of guilty to the charge. He was remanded to March 15. Pride of the entire police force in the work of the two constables was evident yesterday at the police station where all conversation centred around the sensational capture. Only a short time ago Constable Acorn was responsible for discovering another break, capturing the person responsible and recovering all the stolen goods all within an hour.

Fear was expressed today for the hockey career of Cst. Arsenault who has long been one of the outstanding forwards on top local teams. It was reported he was on the operating table at the hospital for an hour early this morning as physicians stitched the ugly wounds. However, the game policeman was in court with Cst. Acorn this morning.

Injures Foot In Elevator

Glen Ford, 17, Malpeque Road, received a crushed foot when he reportedly lost his balance and his left foot became caught between a cement wall and the floor of a descending elevator at Atlantic Wholesalers about 10:15 Wednesday morning.

He was examined at the Prince Edward Island Hospital by Dr. E. S. Giddings who said the foot was bruised but there were no bones broken.

Selling Liquor Case Adjourned

A drunk and disorderly was remanded to March 13 and a person charged with disorderly conduct had his case dismissed with a warning to create better conditions in his home.

Reid Appeal Comes To Sudden Halt

John Henry Reid's appeal to the Supreme Court against a conviction of operating a restaurant without a license came to a sudden halt before Mr. Justice George J. Tweedy Wednesday morning when the court raised a question as to the validity of the city bylaw under which the appellant was convicted.

The appeal was adjourned to March 26 for argument on the point when Mr. Justice Tweedy suggested the bylaw appeared to be directed towards restaurant employees rather than the owner. He suggested a referral to the bylaw to the Full Bench for consideration.
