Stocks Down In N. Y. Last Week

NEW YORK (AP) — The stock market declined again last week as uncertainty in the Middle East situation continued.

The Associated Press average of 60 stocks was down \$1 to \$177.90.

The market was higher for the first two days of the week then slid off for the remainder. It was a wavering process rather than a decisive decline.

Brokers reported increasing switches in stock holdings with year-end tax considerations in view. Some market weakness was attributed partially to this.

The world situation was taken by Wall Street to mean there would be no stop in defense spending. Copper had additional motive for rising through firmness in world copper prices.

Among Canadian issues on the New York Exchange, only Granby Mining showed a gain, moving up to close at 11. Those moving down included Aluminum Ltd., down 4 1/2 to 118 1/2 Canadian Pacific 3/4 to 32 1/2; Hudson Bay's 3/4 to 89 1/2, and International Nickel which dropped 8 1/2 to close at 120 1/2.

Learning To Exist & Work In The Far North Is Project

OTTAWA (CP) — Much of Canada's progress in development and defence of its frigid north will be determined by a group of Canadian scientists tackling problems created by sub-zero temperatures.

Their work ranges from the development of civilian and military equipment able to operate in Arctic and sub-Arctic regions to the design of buildings and clothing necessary to enable men to live and work in extremely low temperatures.

Most of the research is centered in three divisions here of the National Research Council—mechanical engineering, biology and building research.

The below-zero experiments already have solved many problems. One recent development is a special oil which can be used to lubricate machinery at temperatures as low as 65 degrees below zero.

The oil was required for radar equipment, but now is being used for many other military and civilian purposes as well. Development of this type also are proving valuable in other Canadian areas which experience rigorous winter conditions.

But the interests of Canada's cold-weather scientists extend into many other fields, including the development of frozen foods.

The biology division now is conducting an extensive research program to find a method to permit the commercial production of frozen concentrated milk. It would be marketed much like frozen soups.

This division has also discovered why some Christmas dinners are spoiled by tough frozen turkeys and other fowl. Extensive tests show that the meat of fowl will tender only if the bird is not frozen until it has been dead 24 hours.

Most of the experiments on equipment and material for the far north are being conducted by the mechanical engineering division in low-temperature laboratories. It operates two cold rooms in which the temperature can be dropped to 70 degrees below zero.

Work now is in progress in the cold rooms on methods to enable ground radar installations in the Arctic to shed ice. Experiments are also being made on de-icing equipment for aircraft and helicopters and to prevent jet engines accumulating ice.

The cold-weather scientists recently developed automatic instruments to measure icing conditions in flight. The instruments are suitable for military aircraft but do not yet meet civilian requirements.

Land vehicles are being tested to see how they act under Arctic conditions. This includes the development of new brake fluids, greases and fuel systems for better operation at frigid temperatures.

The armed services are testing new and old equipment. One of the main problems in the development of recoil and shell loading mechanisms which will protect guns against cold-weather failure.

The cold chambers have expedited the development of suitable clothing for Arctic use. The biology division also is trying to reach a better understanding of how humans can live in the north, through tests on small mammals.

The biologists have determined that the cold-resistance of deer mice captured in winter is much greater than that of mice snared in summer. They also have learned that exercise doesn't help keep animals warm in winter.

These tests may eventually lead in findings that will enable humans to live more comfortably in the Arctic winter.

STRUCTURAL RESEARCH

Experiments on the development of homes and buildings which will withstand the north's sub-zero weather are being conducted by the division of building research. The studies also include construction of suitable roads, bridges and other structures.

The cold rooms are warm compared with the frigid temperatures necessary for experiments in the low-temperature and solid-state divisions of NRC. This division conducts tests which it hopes will lead man to a better understanding of the fundamental laws of matter.

A machine used by this division can drop the temperature of liquid helium to about 456 degrees below zero, some four degrees short of absolute zero. The lowest temperature ever recorded in Canada was 81 degrees below zero at Snag, Yukon, in February, 1947.

Expect Higher Net Income For Most Farmers, Ottawa Reports

OTTAWA (CP)—Despite higher operating expenses, Canadian farmers are expected to wind up this year with a higher net income than for 1955. Heavier grain marketings are making the difference.

The agriculture department, without giving any figures, says in its current review of the farm economy that information available to the middle of September indicates "farm cash income for the year 1956 will be above the 1955 level."

It adds that "although the increase in farm cash income will likely be offset to some extent by increased operating expenses and smaller additions to inventories."

The agriculture department says the greatest contribution to a cash income increase is expected to come from grain, particularly wheat. "In almost all cases, marketings of grains are estimated well above the 1955 levels."

Farm stocks of grain continued to build up this year but at a much slower rate than in 1955. The above car is being sold pursuant to a conditional sales agreement made between Stanley Dingwell, 100 Dorchester St., Charlottetown, P.E.I. and Johnston Motors Ltd., Murray River, P.E.I. which contract was duly assigned to Traders Finance Corporation Limited.

Some indication of the extent of the expected increase can be seen in the 13-per cent boost in cash income during the first six months of 1956 over the same period of 1955. Total farm operating expenses and depreciation charges likely would run higher in 1956 than last year, the most significant increase being for feeds as a result of poorer pasture conditions last spring and unfavorable fall harvesting weather for eastern grain. But farm income would still be higher than last year.

But even if the rate of increase goes up in the last half this year as it usually does, farmers' 1956 net income likely will be below the record \$2,154,527,000 for 1951.
