Proctor dissented. The Judge who voted for granting the brief stay are Charles Fahy, Henry W. Edgerton, David L. Bazelon, E. Barrett Prettyman and George T. Washington. The ruling by the nine-man Appeals Court does not in any way differ with legality of seizure. It simply postponed for almost two days the effectiveness of the Pine order.

Most King's Co. Fishermen Run Lobster Lines

At twelve noon yesterday, with motors running open, lobster boats were lined up ready for the dash to the fishing grounds. At the given signal fishermen engaged their motors, and every boat moved forward, water spray covering the whole scene. For a brief moment it seemed as if in the haste accidents could not but occur, but in a short time each boat was on course heading for the fisherman's particular spot.

On the whole the fishermen were successful in running their lines although a thick fog blanketed the whole area until noon when it began to lift just before the zero hour. The north shore fishermen and east coast fishermen extending to Murray Harbour encountered no difficulty in running their lines, and a few set out traps.

However, the Murray Harbour and South Shore fishermen were unable to run lines owing to a large ice pack which enclosed the whole area. Fishermen of the area have drawn up an agreement to run their lines on Monday, May 5th, at 9 a. m. They hope that during that period an offshore wind will break the pack to clear the shore thus permitting the

fishermen to get to the grounds. It is also unofficially reported that lines were not run yesterday at Picotou Island, the whole area being enclosed by ice. Fishermen who were able to get lines out ran into only a light wind which diminished the usual hazards of line running day. Some seventy boats moved out of Georgetown area going to Burnt Point, Panmure Island reef, Middle Ground, Hanson Ground, Launching Reef, Boughton Island, and outside. Approximately 65 boats left North Lake, 35 from Souris, and over 40 from Fortune all heading out to the reefs. It is reported that a complaint was lodged with inspectors that certain fishermen had left for the grounds before the noon hour. It is understood that this complaint is being investigated. The bait situation was described as good, three ships having arrived at Souris from the Magdalen Islands, two at Georgetown, and one at Murray Harbour. Although at the present time the run of herring locally is light, it is expected to improve so that bait will be plentiful throughout the season.
