DOMINION PARLIAMENT

Summary of Proceedings.

OTTAWA, March 3.

Mr. Barrow's action relative to the Jesuits Estates Bill excites supreme disgust among his colleagues on the Opposition benches. It appears that he is guided solely by his own interests. He intended to bring up the subject on Friday, of last week on the motion to go into committee of supply, but yielding to the representations of his friends placed a notice on the order paper which is likely not to be reached this session and effectually prevents bringing forward the question in another manner. His insincerity is very evident.

The extradition Bill of Mr. Weldon, of Alberta, excites more interest than any public measure introduced by a private member for many years. All classes concur it would be a good thing if the bill pass, and Canada get rid of the colony of United States bootleggers. Efforts are being made to induce the Government to afford facilities for the passage of the measure.

A decision respecting the fast Atlantic service will likely be reached this week. It is learned positively that the Allans will not tender, and the Andersons are expected to be the only contractors.

The Government has decided to reimpose the same canal tolls on the St. Lawrence as last season—two cents per ton on wheat bound to Montreal or ports east.

Sir Charles Interviewed.

MONTREAL, March 2.

Sir Charles Tupper arrived this morning at 8.30, and left twenty minutes later for Ottawa. To a correspondent of the High Commissioner spoke as follows: "Both stories about the time of my coming to Canada at this cause are entirely incorrect. In regard to the first, that I am to succeed Sir John Macdonald in the Premiership, and that Sir John is to be British Minister to the United States, I hope the day is far distant when Sir John will cease to be Premier of Canada, and to say further, positively, that the next British Minister to the United States will not be Sir John Macdonald, but Sir Julian Pauncefote. Neither is Sir John to resign the Premiership for any cause, nor do I have any intention of leaving my present office. The other story is equally untrue that I am to take charge of Canadian trade or fishery negotiations at Washington. I may say definitely that neither Great Britain nor the Canadian Government will take the initiative in any movements of this character." He said he had come over merely to give evidence in the C. P. R. arbitration and expected to return to England within two months to resume his official duties. Both Sir Charles and Lady Tupper are in excellent health.

The Attack on the C. P. R.

MONTREAL, March 3.

Speaking of the attack in Friday's Toronto Mail, on new legislation asked of the Dominion Parliament in the Canada Pacific Railway, ex-President VanHorne to-day said that the company was never in a more comfortable financial position than at present, and had no immediate need of money, but as its principal undertakings were about completed, the directors thought it wise to take steps towards a consolidation of its obligations and simplification of its finances, and to make provision for the probable requirements of the future. When asked, "What have you to say about the insinuations of the Mail that the Government might yet have to take over and work your road?" Mr. VanHorne immediately replied: "The Dominion Government is not likely to find itself obliged to work a railway, which, for its second year of operation, afforded a profit of nearly \$4,000,000, and whose profits are rapidly increasing." The President also said that passenger trains would be running between Montreal and St. John, over the Short Line, by the 15th of May.

Rumors of a Conflict.

KIEL, March 3.

A rumor is current in naval circles here that a conflict has taken place in Samoan waters between an American man-of-war and the German corvette Oiga.

WASHINGTON, March 2.

Secretary Bayard said to-night that he had not heard anything of the reported conflict between German and American warships in Samoan waters, and regarded such a conflict as highly improbable.

The Pope's Birthday.

ROME, March 3.

Yesterday was the seventy-ninth anniversary of the birth of the Pope. He was in splendid health. Replying to the Cardinals' congratulations, he said it was impossible in the present position of the papacy to perform his duties as head of the church in an independent manner. He complained of the delay in granting exequators to Italian Bishops, and said his appointments were subject to scrutiny.

O'Connor Wins.

SAN FRANCISCO, March 3.

The boat race to-day, between William O'Connor, of Toronto, and Jacob Gaudsaur, of St. Louis, for \$1,000 a side, and the championship of America, over the three-mile course on the Alameda, was won by O'Connor, in 19 minutes and 45 seconds.

A New Cabinet.

ROME, March 3.

Signor Crispi is being charged with the formation of a new cabinet.
