Features Of Farm Price Act Outlined By P.M.

The features of a new Farm Price Support Act, effective March 3, was outlined by Prime Minister John Diefenbaker, speaking to an enthusiastic audience of 1,000, who crowded into the Capitol Theatre at Summerside yesterday afternoon.

Mr. Diefenbaker also described his government's special interest in the Atlantic Provinces in legislation which provided \$25 million grants-in-aid to this area; plans for electrical power development; an \$8 million development at the Summerside R. C. A. F. Station; increased social security benefits; veterans legislation; and reduced taxation on small businesses.

In discussion the Farm Price Support Act he said that since 1953 the farmer has faced rising costs of production and falling revenue from production. He asked his listeners to examine the legislation providing for setting up a stabilization board, pointing out that it will act each year, after hearing from an advisory board composed of farmers or farm representatives. He noted, too, that the Maritime representative, Mr. Lincoln Dewar, is from Prince Edwards Island.

"Each year, before the crop season", said the Prime Minister, "the farmer will know the lowest price that he will receive."

That price, in order to insure the farmer of his fair share of the national income, is to bear a fair relation to the cost of farmers' production," said Mr. Diefenbaker, adding "that's what farmers have been asking for."

AIRPORT PLANS

In the constitution of Prince County he noted that the government was spending \$8 million on airport facilities at R. C. A. F. Station, and added that the Liberals were saying, "well we thought about that too."

Concluding his talk, Mr. Diefenbaker said that "in eight months we have done things that the last government played around with for years and years, what we are asking now," he said, "is that you send back your candidate, Dr. Orville Phillips, to join with those from all parts of Canada representing a Conservative Government, to assure a reasonable opportunity for all. I ask you to join with my friend, Dr. Phillips. Send him back. We need him in Ottawa."

On their arrival by air, on their third visit to Summerside in the past year, Mr. and Mrs. Diefenbaker were welcomed by a large delegation, and were guests at a luncheon at the R.C.A.F. station.

Long before their arrival in the town of Summerside all seating accommodation had been taken in the Capitol Theatre, and available standing room was filled.

Chairman of the meeting was J. W. Don Campbell president of West Prince Progressive Conservative Association.

Platform guests, in addition to the Prime Minister and his wife, included Melvin McQuaid, president of the P.E.I. Progressive Conservative Association; John A. MacDonald, candidate in King's County; Hon. Angus MacLean, and Heath MacQuarrie, candidates in Queen's County; Walter Shaw, provincial leader of the Conservative Party; Mrs. Donald Lidstone, president of the Women's P.C. Association of the West.

Before the meeting began, a civic welcome to Prime Minister and Mrs. Diefenbaker was extended by Mayor W.A. Currie of Summerside, and a corsage was presented to Mrs. Diefenbaker by little Miss Debbie Gallant, three-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Edmond Gallant.

After the public meeting, the official party made a brief call at the Summerside Civic Building before continuing by car to Charlottetown to a public meeting there last evening.

This Is "D" Day At St. Raphael

Today is "D" at St. Raphael, the day when the Imperial Oil derrick is slated to be erected over the site where the first well is to be drilled in search for oil or natural gas.

The derrick, 147 feet high, was originally slated for raising yesterday but Tuesday night's storm delayed the action, which is now scheduled for ten o'clock this morning.

The actual erection on the derrick takes but a few minutes and is accomplished by steel cables attached to motors on the sub-structure which will hoist the huge tower into a vertical position. A short time later all will be in readiness for the actual drilling operation which could possibly continue to a depth of two miles.

"I'm handed a note that says, 'speak louder' the Progressive Conservative leader said, as Mrs. Diefenbaker hid her face behind his hands.

"It didn't come from any resident of this locality," The loudspeakers finally began to operate about half-way through his speech.

In addition, the list repeats projects which were announced by the government months ago at a time when it was taking the position unemployment was virtually non-existent — items such as thermal power units in the maritimes, forest access roads and picnic and camping grounds—all at a cost this year of \$50,000,000.

What the government appears to have done, in short, is to have snafled from each federal department a list of routine expenditures which might involve construction work of any type. By adding them together, coming up with a total of \$1,185,000,000 and announcing it as a vast new works' program, the government appears to be guilty of some misrepresentation.

It is probably true that the government has stepped up these routine expenditures — though the comparative figures aren't available — to help curb unemployment.

But the extra amount involved — that sum beyond what might be spent in a normal year — is undoubtedly far short of even \$500,000,000, much less \$1,185,000,000.

If the Liberals thus far haven't discovered this gaping chink in the government's armor, they're bound to pounce on it very soon.

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
