Pearson Urges Nuclear Weapons For Canadians

OTTAWA (CP) — Opposition Leader Pearson Friday urged procurement of tactical nuclear weapons — chiefly anti-aircraft weapons — for Canada's armed forces.

He also suggested integration of Canadian and American defence and said Canada will have to concentrate still more effort on air defence.

The Liberal leader spoke before the Commons gave quick approval to the \$1,686,000,000 defence budget and the estimates of the defence production department.

Defence Minister Peakes said decisions will have to be reached this year on "many" difficult defence problems.

"They are with me every day and pretty nearly 24 hours of every day," he said.

GROWING NEED
Some conventional arms would be retained because "I see a growing need for contributions" to United Nations organizations, whether on a permanent or special basis.

Mr. Pearson said a situation can be contemplated where Canadian squadrons under North American Air Defence Command (NORAD) would not have nuclear weapons while U.S. squadrons under NORAD had them.

"I suggest this is a situation which, in the long run, will not be considered tolerable in this country," he added.

Arrangements should be made now with the U.S. for procurement of nuclear weapons because there would be no time to do this in an emergency.

Mr. Pearson said Canada could not afford to keep up with every move in the defence field.

Air defence was more important than ever before and Canada would be asked to make a bigger contribution to air defence: New radar and ground controls and anti-aircraft missiles.

Imports Of Industrial Goods Slide

OTTAWA (CP) — Imports of industrial goods continued to slide in April, pushing total imports for the first four months of 1958 to the lowest point since 1955.

April's purchases declined to \$449,300,000 from \$537,200,000 last year, reducing the annual-April total to \$1,638,500,000, down 13.6 per cent from last year's record \$1,896,500,000, the bureau of statistics reported Friday.

Average prices of imports rose during the four months so that the volume of goods imported fell even more than the value.

Exports remained fairly steady, annual-April shipments totalling \$1,468,700,000, compared with \$1,491,000,000 last year.

Canada's deficit in trade — the excess of imports over exports — dropped to \$169,900,000, from \$405,500,000.

EXPANSION STILL OFF
The big import drop in 1958 was in industrial goods, reflecting a continuation of the lower Canadian rate of expansion.

During the four months imports of non-farm machinery declined to \$177,332,000, from \$228,362,000; auto parts to \$89,107,000, from \$106,823,000; crude oil to \$85,966,000, from \$92,529,000; farm implements to \$64,907,000, from \$89,863,000; automobiles to \$52,227,000, from \$55,129,000.
