Stedman's New S' side Store Will Feature 'Self-Service'

SUMMERSIDE—Variety store self-service will be featured at Steadman's new Summerside store, which opens Thursday morning.

The new store will be entirely self-service except for the lunch counter and two merchandise counters, which will handle the smaller items such as pens, pocket knives, etc.

With shopping baskets provided by the store, the customer will be free to browse around without being interrupted unless he requests service.

Built by Kenny Construction of Yarmouth, N.S., the store measures 65 feet by 100 feet and has a total counter space of 787 square feet. The interior is painted in pastel shades of green and yellow.

Employing the "shop as you please, pay as you go" idea, Earl Ruggles, manager of the store, states that the whole idea of the store is to display the merchandise to its best advantage and to make it as easy as possible for the customer to shop.

Bringing the total number of company stores in operation to 124, plus 212 associated stores, the new Summerside store is the eighth Steadman store to be built this year and is classed among the largest of company stores.

An eye-catching feature of the store is the ultra-modern lunch counter, which will seat 28 patrons. Situated in the basement, directly below the lunch counter, is a food room which is equipped with every modern cooking device and where the more elaborate meals will be cooked.

For faster shopping, Steadman's have four check-out counters equipped with modern cash registers, which automatically give the correct amount of change, thus eliminating mistakes.

The store's 14 Island counters are done in Rox-A-Tone finish and are of the low-boy type, enabling customers to see at a glance, any particular item they are looking for.

An escalator, running from the stockroom, which is situated in the basement, to the main floor of the building, allows merchandise to reach the sales floor in a matter of seconds. The stock room is also marked, with

each item of merchandise having its own certain location. There is also a complete "intercom" system throughout the building.

Formerly of Weymouth, N.S., the manager, Mr. Ruggles has been in charge of the former Steadman Store in Summerside for the past two years. Prior to coming to Summerside, Mr. Ruggles managed stores at St. Stephen, N.B. and Bridgetown, N.S. and has been with the company for the past nine years.

He is 25 years old and received his training in Digby, N.S. and New Castle, N.B.

Inquest Is Adjourned; 3 Witnesses Testify

MONTAGUE BUREAU OF THE GUARDIAN

The inquest into the death of Mary Grace MacNeill as the result of highway crash near Murray River on the night of July 25th was further adjourned last night after three witnesses testified.

The crash this summer in addition to resulting in the death of Miss MacNeill, also hospitalized eight others, including six members of the Lecco family, Wayne Harris and Stephen Palmer.

The chief coroner, Dr. L. E. Prowse, presided at the hearing. At the inquest, held in the Montague Legion Hall last night the coroner outlined the evidence of the witnesses heard at the previous inquest last night were: Barry Travis Lecco, Frank Wayne Harris and Edward Stephen Dexter Palmer, driver of the car owned by his aunt, Mary Jane Chapman of Connecticut, U.S.A.

Illegal Fishing Charges Dropped

A charge of possession of 16 short lobsters against Lemont Hutt of Alberton South was dismissed by a magistrate's court at Summerside yesterday by Magistrate W. Chester S. MacDonald. The dismissal was granted after Defence Counsel George R. MacMahon made the request due to lack of prosecution as no fisheries officers were present in the court. No action was taken on six other charges under the coastal Fisheries Act and two under the Fisheries Act against Lemont and Cecil Hutt as the court had no record of these charges.
