Mr. Bell Queries Highway Minister

Yesterday in the Legislature Opposition Leader Bell asked the Minister of Highways why the snow banks on the Trans-Canada Highway are not cut back between storms.

He said he had received complaints from several responsible people who feel that the Trans-Canada Highway is not getting the protection it should. Mr. Bell thought if the banks were not cut down serious damage would result.

In answer to Mr. Bell's question, Hon. J. George MacKay said, "At the present moment the question is not hard to answer. The reason is that every plow in the Province is working clearing the roads many of which are not yet open."

Mr. MacKay said his Department was well aware of the question raised by Mr. Bell but it was not all as simple as it appears. He said that during the past 34 hours in addition to trying to keep the roads open the Department was asked to respond to seven sick calls.

He said he has given orders that where necessary contractors' equipment will be used to remove snow in areas where the T.C.H. may be in danger of damage.

Mr. MacKay said there were those who advocate the removal of all the snow off the shoulder of the T.C.H. before any secondary roads are cleared. "My answer to that person is, 'Why do you advocate such steps if you were living on a secondary road?'" said Mr. MacKay.

First 10 Minutes In Baby's Life Most Important

MONTREAL (CP)—The first 10 minutes in a baby's life are the most important in the care of human life, a Halifax obstetrics professor said Wednesday.

"Obstetrical obsession with the mother has been eminently successful," said Dr. H. B. Atlee. "But the fate of the baby is another kettle of fish."

Infant deaths in the first week are still too common, he told 1,000 family doctors attending the scientific meeting of the College of General Practice of Canada. Attending doctors should keep the child in full view for 15 minutes after delivery.

Most deaths in new-born infants were due to prematurity, nature's abnormalities or to labor complications "that even the best skills cannot completely circumvent," said Dr. Atlee. But many were attributable to inadequate attention in the first few minutes of life. Dr. Lewis J. Dill of Winnipeg said "practically all children

Local Sea Cadets Have Secretary Speak

Mr. Harry R. Gillard, national secretary, Navy League of Canada, paid a visit to R.C.S.C.C. Kent on Tuesday night. He viewed the cadets on the rifle range and spoke to them on the Parade deck at H.M.C.S. Queen Charlotte.

Mr. Gillard said there are several scholarships to be awarded to any deserving cadet who can qualify for same. There will also be a number of cruises this summer on H.M. ships and some cadets will go to Sweden by way of the United Kingdom. These cadets will also go by H.M. ships.

Mr. Gillard presented the youngest cadet, with a sea cadet crest to be worn on his blazer. He told about another presentation he made on his visit in 1942, which was a baseball autographed by Babe Ruth. This went to the cadet who did the best job of recruiting that year. After Mr. Gillard's talk he was given three cheers by the cadets.

MUST DIAGNOSE WELL
"We must differentiate in a small child between impaired hearing, mental retardation, language disturbance as a result of mild brain injury and psychological factors," he said.

Some tests could be successfully given to children as young as three years and others at even younger ages.

Most children with a moderate hearing loss could be fitted with hearing aids, but in the nerve type of deafness, the aid should be prescribed by a specialist, he said. The convention ends Wednesday night.

In closing addresses, Dr. Hans Selve of Montreal dealt with his research in stress on the human body and a four-man panel discussed vaccines.

Postpone U.K. Loan Payment

OTTAWA (CP)—Canada and the United Kingdom Wednesday signed an agreement postponing payment of \$22,000,000 in interest due last year on this country's post-war loan to Britain.

Under the agreement announced in the Commons by Finance Minister Harris, Canada also would allow a maximum of seven deferrals of annual principal and interest payments during the remaining 45-year life of the \$1,100,000,000 loan made in 1946. That would be commensurate on the United States granting a similar deferral. Postponed instalments would bear two-per-cent interest.

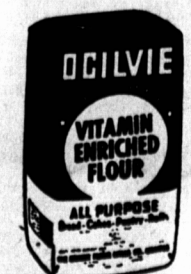

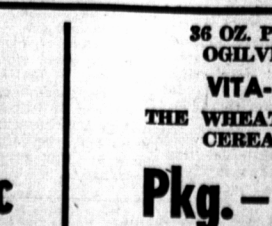
