

Chicago White Sox Get Kluszewski From Pirates

CHICAGO (AP) — Chicago White Sox obtained Ted Kluszewski, the once-mighty National League slugger, from Pittsburgh Tuesday in a move that could make easier their efforts to win the American League pennant.

To complete the waiver transaction, the White Sox, with a team batting average of only .250 and a major league low of 76 homers, gave up outfielder Harry Simpson and Bob Sagers, an infielder with Indianapolis, a Sox affiliate in the American Association.

Odds Favor Basilio To Win Title Match

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — Odds ranging from 2-1 to 7-5 Tuesday favored Carmen Basilio over Gene Fullmer on Friday night when they battle at the Cow Palace for the National Boxing Association world middleweight boxing title.

Still there wasn't much wagering reported on the outcome of the scheduled 15-rounder between the two bellers who each has at one time held possession of the 160-pound crown.

Fullmer from West Jordan, Utah, already has wound up his public drills with only one losing and some loosening up during the best of the week.

Basilio scheduled more boxing as he worked to sharpen his attack.

Told that the odds were against his man, Fullmer's manager Marvin Jensen, replied, "Odds mean nothing to us. We're getting ready for an important fight and both Gene and I know Basilio will run second best, even if the odds are reported 2-1."

Gene had just finished his final sparring session beating Billy Murray with a vicious body attack indicating how he figures to slow down his foe from Chittenango, N.Y.

Basilio meanwhile used Leo Owens for three rounds of shooting hooks and right leads to the head.

PRINCE EDWARD ISLAND racing fans were mighty disappointed with the result of Saturday's big classic at Sackville Downs. They had counted heavily on their favorite, Mighty Lee, grabbing top honors but the roan gelding wasn't able to get better than 3-5.

Dave Gratton was the surprise of the entire show sporting a 2-1 summary and boasting the best mile, 2:05.2. Most folks had figured that last dash was strictly a Convair-Mighty Lee battle but Don Ratford reined the Halifax gelding down that homelane in a terrific hurry to nip Breaux's Convair and grab the lion's share of the big purse.

MIGHTY LEE appeared to tire badly in that final mile. He made his bid in the first half but couldn't go around the Convair who went away on the rail. The George Callbeck driven gelding was heavy favorite at the mutuels despite the fact that he finished behind Convair and Dave Gratton in that opening dash.

Operators of Sackville certainly should think of Mighty Lee in the kindest of ways. The horse that tramped the Charlotte-town track in 2:03.4 brought fans to the Downs from every part of the Maritimes. It was Mighty Lee that was the big attraction—make no mistake about that. His entry in that big race meant much financially to those in charge of the Halifax track. If Mighty Lee had decided to stay at Charlottetown, that Saturday race would have just been another ordinary race.

HOWEVER MIGHTY LEE didn't do what Convair and Dave Gratton did when the Old Home Week show was on in Charlottetown. Callbeck showed enough courage to leave his own backyard and do battle with the top pacers of the Maritimes. Convair and Dave Gratton were among the missing when that free-for-all went at the local driving park.

Of course that's entirely the business of the owners. Nobody can make them race where they don't want to. And apparently they didn't want to go against Mighty Lee on the Charlottetown track.

Both Convair and Dave Gratton proved they were great pacers by going such outstanding miles under adverse weather conditions Saturday. Nobody can take that away from them.

However, we are hard to convince. We don't think any less of the big roan than we did a week ago. He certainly is entitled to a holiday and he had one Saturday. The fact remains that Mighty Lee's 2:03.4 mile is still tops for 1959 in the Maritimes. He never got a chance to battle the other greats on the local track and there's little chance that he will now. We still believe that he can take the measure of either Convair or Dave Gratton over the local racing strip.

At any rate, Sackville Downs operators are mighty grateful that Mighty Lee came down this way this year. He was the greatest drawing card they could hope to find and he surely packed them in at the big Nova Scotia track. He also was responsible for what we believe was the greatest part-mutuel "take" in the history of the Maritimes.

Sure, Sackville Downs will always have a warm spot in its heart for Mighty Lee.

And why shouldn't they?

PITTSBURGH PIRATES treated those Los Angeles Dodgers in a most unhostile way when the Alstonites visited Forbes Field recently. The Dodgers were up there challenging the Giants for the top spot until the Buccaneers got hold of them.

JOE GORDON'S Cleveland Indians are making a determined bid to get back in the thick of the American league pennant race.

DOWN THE BACK STRETCH

The Messenger Pace, purse \$112,494.29, which was raced at Roosevelt Raceway last Friday night, drew one of the fastest fields that ever faced a starter, and the purse was probably the largest ever competed for by three-year-olds. It also brought attention to the fact that Adios was the sire of two of the favorites—Adios Oregon and Adios Butler, and also the sire of Meadow Al, driven by Joe O'Brien.

Adios Oregon had won \$54,300 and had a record of 2:01 3/5; Adios Butler had won \$65,725 and had a record of 2:01 1/5; Meadow had winnings of \$91,947 and a record of 2:00 3/5; and Adios Day 2:02 4/5, was not classed as highly although he had won \$113,242.

The six other starters had won almost \$120,000 and included Lord Dares, Culver Pick and Newport Admiral.

A near-record crowd saw the race and kept the pari-mutuel ring merry. When the smoke of battle had cleared off, Adios Butler was the winner by half a length; Meadow Al (Joe O'Brien) was second, and Adios Oregon third, time 2:00 1/5—which is a full second better than his previous mark.

In passing, it may be mentioned that Meadow Al was the only free-legged pacer of the eight starters and it is a high tribute to Joe O'Brien's reinsmanship that he was able to make such a showing with him in such a field on a half-mile track. Most of the pacers in the above race will meet again in The Little Brown Jug, to be raced later at Delaware, Ohio.

Indians Defeat Yankees; Dodgers Down Phillies 5-2

CLEVELAND (AP) — Hockey Colavito hit a pair of home runs Tuesday night to lead his tomahappy Cleveland teammates to their seventh straight victory, a 6-3 decision over New York Yankees.

The Yanks took a 1-0 lead in the first inning off Cal McLish (16-6), but the Indians rebounded with four in their half of the inning. Vic Power tied the score with a smash over the left field fence. Two walks followed and Colavito then drove a Whitey Ford pitch into the same sector for a 4-1 Cleveland lead.

Cleveland added two more in the fifth. One was Colavito's 37th home run to tie Harmon Killebrew of Washington for the major league lead in that department.

PHILADELPHIA (AP) — Home runs by Gil Hodges and Duke Snider led Los Angeles Dodgers to a 5-2 victory over Philadelphia Tuesday night and gave southpaw Johnny Podres his 12th victory.

It was the Phillies' sixth consecutive loss and a setback for righthander Robin Roberts who absorbed his 14th defeat against 11 victories.

Podres, now 3-2 against the Phillies, allowed six hits, one a second-inning homer by Harry Anderson.
