"It is a glorious afternoon. We could motor out to Willoughby's for tea."

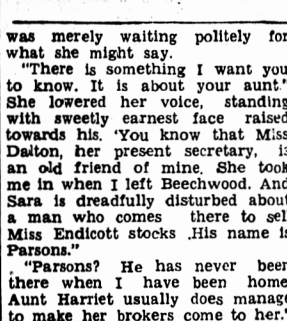
"I go, Frances. I really don't feel like it."

True Success Story

Of the men who mapped the skies—and there were a number of them—none had such a hectic career as Galileo Galilei, and none fared so badly or gained greater fame. Many unpleasant events in his life came about because he felt convinced that much of the teachings of the day was not right, although they had been handed down by such scholars as Ptolemy, Aristotle, etc.

When Galileo pointed out these mistakes to his pupils they resented what he taught and said it could not be, even though the Master proved his point before their very eyes. One of the arguments under discussion was, whether two bodies of different weights dropped from the same height, would reach the earth at the same time. Aristotle said no, Galileo said yes, and he proved it by dropping lead balls of different weights from the tower of Pisa.

About this time the young scientist's father died and he was obliged to support his mother, one brother, and two sisters, all on a very little amount of money. At the age of twenty-seven he was made professor of Mathematics at Padua. Here he remained for a period of eighteen years, doing an enormous amount of work for science. People from every part of Europe crowded his lecture rooms to hear the learned lectures. In addition to all this work he undertook to tutor a number of students because the meagre salary he earned was not enough to keep the wolf from the door.

Like other star-gazers he first believed in Ptolemy's system but as his studies progressed he came to see that Copernicus and not Ptolemy was right; and so, he

started teaching the latter's system although he knew it meant danger to himself.

In 1609 he studied the moon through his new telescope and discovered it was like our earth, having mountain ranges and extensive valleys. Greater wonders were yet to be unveiled. The system of planets were different from what the great scientists had previously taught. For instance, Galileo found that lesser planets revolved around Jupiter, just as other planets circled the sun. These remarkable discoveries excited Galileo's enemies to a new pitch of anger. To convince them Galileo had them take a peep in the heavens which brought Galileo fame, and he went to Florence at a much larger salary.

In spite of his fame his enemies caused him to be summoned before the Inquisition where he was warned not to teach that the earth goes around the sun.

But in 1632 he wrote a book which again brought him before the Inquisition. This time he was charged with teaching things contrary to the Bible. Namely, that the sun rises and sets, but that the earth rotates around it.

The trial ended with the great man being charged with heresy and order to be put into prison, though he was not tortured as some historians claim.

After his release he worked at his discoveries, and wrote several books of great value, till he became totally blind.

This total darkness in the closing years of his life was a real tragedy, for this man, who, more than any other, was to teach us many of the wonders of the heavens, was himself shut out from viewing their glories.

Galileo died in the seventy-eighth year of his life, internationally famous and one of the world's immortals, for he has left mankind a great heritage of knowledge.
