

# Youth Club Trips Saints 8-4

## Squarebriggs Nets Two As B. Y. C. Moves Into Second

Spy Ready's Basilica Youth Club rammed in four big goals without a reply in the second period to double the score on St. Dunstan's University 8-4 in an Island League tussle at the Sports Arena last night.

The victory boosted the youth club back into second place and, by virtue of the loss Saints lost their chance to gain a berth in the playoffs.

The youth club, playing their final game of the regular schedule, finished the season with an 11-11 record for a solid .500 average. Summerside Aces must win their remaining games against Parkdale and Saints to dislodge B.Y.C. from second place.

**SQUAREBRIGGS TWO**

The remaining five goals were notched by Merrill Pineau, Burke, Whitlock, Red Howatt, and Lloyd Shepherd and coach Ready, before a cut near his right eye forced Jack to return from action late in the first period.

Despite an injured knee that slowed him down Paul (Buck) Davey returned to action and fired two goals in the opening period, as best thing in the game. Jackie Kane, moved up with Davey and Jack MacDonald, shot another and Jean Lemay scored the final S.D.U. goal in the third period.

**NEW REFEREES**

Parkdale Flyers' coach and goal tender, Alie Carver and fearless Frank Roper, made their debut as Island hockey referees, as several of the regular referees were unavailable for work. The duo proved to be about as sharp as officiating as they are at playing and kept the game well in hand at all times. The new combination passed around 8 penalties, 5 which were earned by B.Y.C. All were for minor offences.

We also concede that the Parkdale Players were not exactly hungry with first place tucked safely away. Anyway the Aces provided the home fans with a couple of extra-special thrills, and when a hockey team does that, they're doing all right.

The same player gets a minor penalty for highsticking. With great difficulty he is persuaded to enter the box, and once in there, grapples with a policeman before he finally subsides. What is the penalty now? Just the original two minutes, nothing more. Does this guy have special immunity privileges, or do you have to chase someone around the rink with a hand grenade to get more than a minor?

VERO BEACH, Fla. (AP)—Brooklyn catcher Roy Campanella one of baseball's most astute handlers of pitchers, believes that burlers who adopt the Don Larsen no-windup technique will incur a lot of arm and shoulder injuries.

### President Claims Can. Football Breaks No Laws

EDMONTON (CP)—Ken Montgomery, president of the Canadian Rugby Union and president-elect of the Western Interprovincial Football Union says "Canadian football doesn't break any laws, anti-trust or otherwise."

Montgomery was commenting Tuesday on the United States Supreme Court decision that the National Football League is subject to anti-trust laws.

Montgomery said he agrees in principle with the court finding. "We have two leagues in Canada, and while the WIFU club, in the best interests of the league, won't tamper with players on other clubs in the league, a player can always switch leagues. He can always go to the Big Four and vice versa."
