The retirement of Mr. E. E. Clawson, Marine Agent for Prince Edward Island, took place on Saturday.

No appointment of a successor has been made. —BODY NOT FOUND—Up to last evening the body of Cyril Hutt, one of the two fishermen who were drowned on Wednesday morning at the entrance to Alberton harbor, had not been located.

R.C.M.P. officials and local residents are still on the alert and searchers still continue to patrol the shoreline in case the remains are washed ashore. The prevailing winds have, in the meantime, prevented any dragging operations from being carried on.

Mr. P. R. MacCormac, Charlottetown, was re-elected president of the St. Dunstan's University Alumni Association at the annual supper meeting of the Association held in the College dining room following the Graduation Exercises yesterday evening.

Mr. Lorne Driscoll, Summerside, and Mr. Louis Levesque were elected vice-presidents. Mr. Eugene Gorman was re-elected secretary-treasurer and Rev. Edmund Roche, assistant secretary-treasurer. Appointed to the executive committee were: Mr. Justice Mark R. MacGulgan, Rev. T.P. Butler, Major John A. MacDonaid, Dr. Joseph C. MacLellan, Boston, Mr. Charles Trainor, Mr. James Morris and Dr. L. I. Duffy.

Dr. Col. Leo F. MacDonald and Dr. Frank MacMillan were re-elected to the College Board of Governors from the Association. Mr. Charles MacQuaid and Mr. Somerled Trainor were re-elected Association auditors.

Peter Shama of Charlottetown was selected as best actor of the evening in the Maritime Anglican Drama Festival held Friday night at Stewiacke, N.S.

Mr. Shama won his award for his sympathetic portrayal of Tom Holloway in the St. Peter's A.Y.P. production of "Moon Up," under the direction of Mr. Stuart Dickson.

"Moon Up" was awarded second place in the Festival, first being won by the Bridgewater production of "For Whom the Telephone Rings." Arthur MacLean, also of Charlottetown, was a very close second for individual award with his characterization of Harry Holloway, the hardboiled convict brother of Tom.

Other plays presented were "Stewiacke," "Wayside War," "Cracked Ice" by Sydney Mines, and Halifax's "The Bishop's Candlesticks." Adjudicators were Professor Sipplere, Acadia University, and Mrs. Lane of the C.B.C. Drama Club of Halifax.

The residents of Crapaud decided by plebiscite yesterday to incorporate under the provisions of the Village Services Act passed at the last session of the Legislature.

Result of the vote, taken by Queen's County Sheriff John F. Beaton, was 45 for incorporation, 26 against.

Scrutinizers were Messrs. George Watson and Robert Dawson. Miss Jeannette Harvey acted as clerk. Crapaud residents were the first to ask for a plebiscite to vote on this issue. Their petition, duly signed by the required minimum of 26 voters, was received on May 20, just before the application from Parkdale by one day.

After the Government has been duly notified of the results of yesterday's plebiscite, a proclamation will be issued fixing the date on which the "Act" to enable the inhabitants of certain villages to supply themselves with certain services shall apply to Crapaud. The proclamation will also define the boundaries of the village, and will appoint three Commissioners to act as a body corporate, under the title of "The Village Commissioners of Crapaud."

At their first meeting after appointment the Commissioners will elect a chairman, and they will jointly hold office until they or their successors are elected at the first annual meeting of the corporation.

The machinery provided under the Act is somewhat similar to that provided for municipalities, and is intended to facilitate development in small communities of over 100 population.

A report stressing the need of a "reorganized and revitalized" Children's Aid Society and Child Welfare Division of the Provincial Department of Health and Welfare was strongly endorsed at a special meeting of the Charlottetown Children's Aid Society last evening, and plans were discussed for implementing the provisions of the report as speedily as possible.

Prepared at the Society's request by Mr. F. R. MacKinnon, director of child welfare for the Province of Nova Scotia, the report was delivered in Mr. MacKinnon's absence by his assistant, Mr. George Hart.

The report suggests broadening the scope of the operations of the Children's Aid Societies in Charlottetown and Summerside, and changing the name of the organization to that of the Community and Children's Aid Society of Prince Edward Island.

Two committees or divisions, a Child Welfare Division and a Community Welfare Division, are recommended to be set up under a general board, each division working as autonomously as possible. The Child Welfare Division should be managed by two main committees, one located at Charlottetown, the other at Summerside, and should cover the field, not only of Children's Aid Society activities, but family welfare services as well.

The Community Welfare Division should, it is proposed, take the place of a Community Welfare Association.

THURSDAY ABEGWET GOES FOR OVERHAUL—The Car Ferry Abegweit left for Montreal Tuesday morning where she will be given her annual overhaul. It is expected she will be away for a month, possibly longer. Captain John MacGuire is in command of the skeleton crew which is manning the boat. The ferry services during the overhaul period will be taken over by the "Prince Edward Island" under Captains Herbert MacKenzie and Wiley Irving.

Loss estimated at \$10,000 was suffered yesterday morning at Spring Valley, near Kensington when a large barn owned by Mr. James E. MacNeill of Kensington was destroyed by fire. More than 50 pigs were lost also.

The fire broke out about 9:30 A. M. when an engine used to pump water backfired. It spread so rapidly that only a few head of stock could be saved. However all the stock in a large new barn nearby was taken out.

The Kensington Fire Department was called and arrived promptly and with their pumper succeeded in saving the other building which was very near the burning barn and in the path of the flames. The house was not threatened. The Fire Department left men at the scene all day watching the burning ruins in case a blaze would spring up.

Lost were 40 pigs ready for market, 10 pure bred sows and several litters of young pigs. Ten head of cattle were in the barn and some of them escaped but the number could not be ascertained last night.

Also lost was 80 tons of hay which had been sold but not delivered, 1,200 bushel of oats and 100 bushel of seed wheat. The barn was an L-shaped structure and had formerly been two buildings which were joined together. The loss was partly covered by insurance.

Mr. James Earisto is the resident farmer. The farm is a very large one and most of the stock is pure bred. About 70 head of cattle were fortunately out in the fields at the time.—S
