Issues In Campaign Discussed By Liberal

OTTAWA (CP) — Liberal party campaign chairman Walter Gordon has predicted the question of anti-Americanism and liberalization of the Progressive Conservative government's legislative program will be the major issues in the April 8 election campaign. Anti-Americanism could not be made an issue because "Canada is a great trading nation and must get along with its neighbors, he told the annual meeting of the Canadian University Liberal Federation.

WASHINGTON (CP) — Senator Wayne Morse said here Canada's refusal to accept nuclear weapons left "a gaping hole in the defences of the United States" at the time of last fall's Cuban crisis.

MUST TELL CANADA

"We have the right and the obligation to our citizens to find out without further delay whether Canada intends to furnish them the protection of our military forces, and look to Western allies, that the United States can no longer afford to furnish them the protection of our military strength, which they decline, for domestic political reasons or any other, to fulfil their obligations to us."
