Ambassador Urges Need For Anglo-American Unity

The threat which Russia poses to the world and the fact that since the outbreak of the war, the United States and Britain have worked together to maintain world stability and peace were the main themes of the address given by Hon. Livingston T. Merchant, American Ambassador to Canada, in an address to the Canadian Club here last night.

When he left this morning the ambassador carried with him a tray bearing the crest of the City of Charlottetown and engraved with his name, which was presented to him last night by His Worship Mayor J. D. Stewart on behalf of the City.

The honored guest was introduced by Mr. Justice George W. T. L. Meyer who presided and also thanked the speaker on behalf of the club.

Mr. Merchant observed that Russia has risen in four years from a backward feudalistic despotism to a great modern power and still a despotism which in recent weeks has demonstrated spectacularly its formidable achievements in science as well as its transformation into a great industrial power complex.

So dangerous a course so long as we maintain what George Washington called "a respectful defensive posture," observed the speaker. "The Russians hope that by maintaining pressure on us, by infiltration and by sapping our will through propaganda we shall collapse, and then the great prize of world domination will be theirs with out the necessity of war."

"It would be a mistake to discount the many achievements of the Soviet Union and we must realize that we are dealing with a formidable institution whose leaders can act free from the restraint to which we in the West are accustomed," Mr. Merchant observed.
