Let's Talk It Over

During the recent teachers' convention in Charlottetown there was some discussion on the evils of having pupils compete against each other for honors. Those defending this system pointed out that, as the pupils must compete in their post-school pursuits, they may as well get used to it in school. On the surface, the argument seemed to be a good one.

These proponents of competition between pupils in school failed to take into consideration, however, that competition in the waged and professional world is waged at different levels. A group of very able men are in the race for government cabinet positions, for example. Doctors, lawyers and nurses compete against members of the same profession for their various clients. On another level people compete for work as carpenters, plumbers, and down the ladder to street cleaners and scrub-women.

In school, the boy in the back seat is, perhaps, a born pop-corn vendor. Right ahead of him sits a boy who will some day be Premier of the Province. In the indeterminate competition of school life these two boys are pitted against each other for class rank, and the premiership prospect is showered with prizes and praises while the boy who will someday propel his pop-corn perambulator is made to feel that he is a failure.

In after years, the Premier may fail to grasp the special needs of his people and sacrifice his gift of leadership to sectional partisanship and petty prejudice. He has turned out to be a failure if he does. The pop-corn vendor may use his God-given talents cheerfully and with industry, steadfastly refusing to grow a little richer by short-changing small children, and making his customers happy with the sunshine of his friendly smile. He is a howling success.

Tignish Co-op Sales Exceed Half-Million

The annual meeting of the Tignish Co-Operative Association was held in St. Mary's Hall, Tignish, on the evening of April 16th at 7:30.

The meeting was presided over by Joseph A. Arsenault. Minutes of the last annual meeting were read and adopted. The directors report was presented by Joseph W. Doucette and adopted upon motion of Emile J. Gallant, seconded by Leo Dorgan.

The annual financial statement was then read and explained by the manager, Gerald Handrahan. This report showed that total sales for the year amounted to \$545,910.83, with a net income of \$13,932.92 and share and loan capital of \$57,763.20. The value of land, buildings and equipment, less depreciation is \$39,767.43.

Against Increase This Year
"It is for the above mentioned reasons that we maintain that there should not have been any increase in carapace measure this year, or if one were absolutely necessary it should not have been more than 1/8 of an inch."

"We have suggested to the proper authorities that it is not too late to help us rehabilitate ourselves. We suggested that they adopt the proposal made by the Fisheries Development Committee, but set the minimum loss of traps at 100, below which no assistance would be granted. This would mean that some twenty-three of us would benefit after a normal loss of 30% was deducted."

"Preferably we propose that 30% be deducted as a normal loss from each statement of claim presented, and that a loan be made to any fishermen desiring it, on a three year basis with no interest charge, except on a defaulting payment, at a small rate of interest.

"To us these are reasonable proposals which we feel should get careful and sympathetic consideration from the Department of Fisheries. We have prepared this statement not as a reply to a statement made in the local house, nor to provoke a controversy, but to make our position clear on matters which vitally concern us."

OTTAWA (CP)—Justice Minister Garson indicated Friday that the government is prepared to set up a royal commission or parliamentary committee to study possible abolition of capital punishment in Canada.
