SUMMERSIDE — Douglas William Newell, Brackley, was fined \$125 and costs of \$90 by Magistrate W. Chester S. MacDonald in Prince County Magistrate's court yesterday when he pleaded guilty to a charge of failing to stop after being involved in an accident resulting in damage to another vehicle. RCMP stated when the accused was asked the first time he stated his companion was driving the vehicle. He later changed his statement. His companion was charged with being driver of the truck and was held in jail for a night. Magistrate MacDonald pointed out to Newell that he was probably the cause of an innocent man spending a night in jail. Harry Roland Ferguson, Victoria, pleaded not guilty to a charge of impaired driving and one of driving while his license was suspended, and both cases were adjourned for trial to Feb. 7.

'64 Celebrations For All Island, S' side Rotary Told

SUMMERSIDE — William Hayward, chairman of the Centennial Corporation, was the special speaker at yesterday's luncheon of the Summerside Rotary Club. Mr. Hayward told of the formation and functions of the various committees in preparing for the 1964 celebration, which he termed "a very important milestone in the history of this province". Mr. Hayward said the main function of the committee is to properly mark the birthday of Canada. He said his committees are both excited and puzzled by the large number of Islanders that do not know of the centennial celebration planning. The chairman stated that it is a national project—not a community or even a provincial undertaking. The Dominion government had written P.E.I., instructing the province to look after the 1964 celebrations "and we have to put on a pretty good show", commented the guest speaker. Relating a few of the conventions and meetings that will probably be held in this province during 1964, Mr. Hayward said he felt that Summerside has not been allotted as yet its proper share of the meetings. The guest speaker was introduced by Vernon Howatt and thanked by Francis MacNeill. Guest of the meeting was Russell Selley of the Charlottetown Club. Club secretary, John Forbes reported that attendance was almost 100 per cent for the meeting. One member was absent, and he was out of the province. Following the meeting, the Rotarians packed food hampers to be distributed among needy families for Christmas.

United Fund Collections Over 90% And Continuing

In order to keep the public informed with the affairs of the United Fund and community welfare business, fund officials will intersperse bulletins from the provincial headquarters in Charlottetown. The first of these bulletins was received yesterday and in addition to containing messages from the provincial president, Russell Selley and campaign chairman, Brig. W. W. Reid, it gave the latest figures on the recent drive for funds. So far, \$305,000 of the \$327,496 objective has been collected, representing approximately 92 per cent. To date several of the rural districts have not been heard from, and although the official closing date of the campaign was Nov. 30, returns are still coming in from many districts. Based on his observations on these late returns, all officials are confident that the quota will be exceeded. All have highest praise for the work being done by the voluntary canvassers throughout the province. Mr. Selley, compared the fund to Christmas, saying that "it cannot help but to associate our United Fund with the spirit of Christmas giving." He expressed thanks, not only to the workers but to all those who donated toward the continued support of the 17 agencies, who will benefit from the campaign. Brig. Reid, stated that he wished to thank all the workers for "a job well done." Both extended greetings and good wishes to all workers and donors, for a happy Christmas and prosperous New Year. It was also announced in the bulletin, that the annual general meeting will be held Tuesday, Jan. 29, 1963, in the provincial Vocational School theatre at 8 p.m. An invitation is extended to all interested citizens to attend.

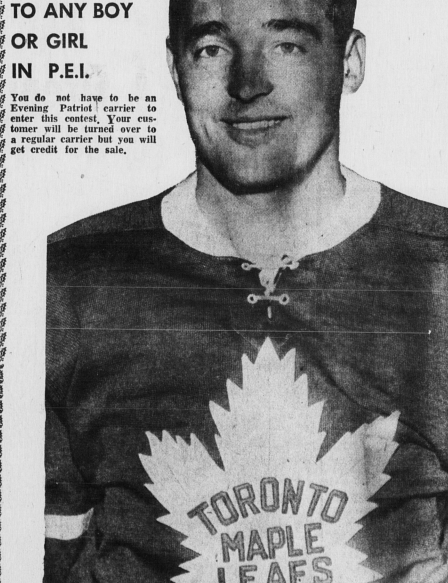
AND STILL THEY COME
