THE mails crossed to, but not from, Cape Tormentine today.

C. D. LANE, St Peter's Bay, has been appointed sub Collector of Customs.

THE session of the City Small Debt Court has been postponed until Wednesday next.

A REGULAR Convocation of Alexandra Royal Arch Chapter will be held this evening, at eight o'clock. By order.

A placard circulated in St. Petersburg declares that Alexander III. is condemned to death definitely and without appeal.

"NORTHERN LIGHT" arrived at Georgetown at 11.30 a. m., to-day. She will leave for Pictou early to-morrow morning.

DON CARLOS has summoned his partisans to a meeting at London to discuss the abdication of his claims to the throne of Spain in favor of his son.

THE first prize heifer was, yesterday, purchased by Messrs. Saunders & Newson, not by Messrs. Blake Bros., as stated in yesterday's issue.

THE real estate boom has reached British Columbia, and heavy sales are said to have been made of late to capitalists from other parts of Canada.

IN the Massachusetts Assembly, on the 30th ult., the bill prohibiting the manufacture and sale of intoxicating liquors was defeated by a tie vote of 110 to 110.

THE RAILWAY.—The Eastern trains are running on time to day. The western section was opened at four o'clock this evening, and all regular trains are now running.

A CONFERENCE of the clergy of the two dioceses of Nova Scotia (including P. E. I.) and Fredericton is to be held in Trinity Church, St. John, on Oct. 17th and 18th.

ACTIVE steps are being taken in Quebec for the formation of a provincial Board of Health. A bill has been drawn up, and will be submitted to the House by the Attorney-General.

THE Italian representative has quitted Montevideo in consequence of not receiving satisfaction in answer to his energetic remonstrance relative to the maltreatment of two Italians by the police.

THE bogus Baron de Longueuil, whose swindling operations in the Maritime Provinces are well known, has been sentenced, at Providence, R. I., to five years in the State Prison, for forgery.

MR. MILLAIS is said to have painted in his recently finished portrait of Cardinal Manning, the finest picture that he has yet given to the world. It is life size, and represents the Cardinal in his scarlet robes.

THIRTY-FIVE lives have been lost at Memphis by the destruction of a river steamer by fire. The fact that twenty-three of the victims were ladies, and that only four of the crew lost their lives, are significantly ugly.

ALL hopes have been abandoned for the safety of two ocean steamers, the "Titania," which sailed from New York for Newcastle on the 24th of January, and the "America," which left Hamburg for New York on the 1st of February.

ONE hundred and twenty negro refugees in the flooded district in Tensas Parish, La. have been drowned in a gin house. The refugees negroes at Natchez are refusing offers of work, preferring to be fed by the Government, and remain idle.

A P. F. ISLANDER KILLED.—A despatch, on Saturday, from Athol, Mass., said: "Moses Devere, an employe on the Fitchburg Railway, was struck by the cars near here last night, and died this morning from his injuries. He was aged about fifty, and was from Prince Edward Island."

MESSRS. CHARLES COLES, Daniel Davies, jr. Dunne Kennedy, Alfred McEachern, Albert Hertz, John Henderson, and Henry Robertson, left to-day by train en route to the far West. They are all young, honest and industrious men, who will, no doubt, succeed in the country of their adoption.

A YOUNG MAN named McNeill, son of Arch McNeill, Kilmare, was killed on Tuesday, by the falling of a tree, in the woods of Lot 10. When the tree was about to fall his companion told him to run, and he, being confused, ran in the wrong direction. His death was instantaneous.—Pat.

At the Stipendiary Magistrate's Court this forenoon, John Malone and James Cass were each sentenced to one month's imprisonment for obtaining, under false pretences, an iron shovel from the Rev. Dr. Murray. Antonio Cuneo, a vagrant, was sentenced to two months' imprisonment with hard labor; and John Doyle, another vagrant, was admonished and discharged.

DURING the Cattle Show, yesterday, the stallions "Hernando" and "Barister" were shown. The first, as a carriage stallion, excited the greatest admiration, and the latter, as a cart stallion, was pronounced, by the great number who saw him, to be the horse the country needs. These two fine animals are owned by private individuals. There are but few good brood mares in the Province. Would it not, then, be well for the Government to import suitable mares in order that superior carriage and cart stock might be raised, and scattered through the Province? It is a loss of money to individuals who secure good stallions, when there are not brood mares to correspond.

THE month of March, 1882, was a very cold one, the mean temperature was only 21° F., or 4° below the average of fifteen years. The lowest temperature for the winter was on the 15th—14° 2' below zero. The snow fall was 29.9 inches, and rain fall 1.39 inches. Total precipitation, 4.775 inches. Up to the end of March the fall of snow for the season was 176.3 inches, as follows:

During the winter season 1874-1875 up to the end of March, 135.5 inches of snow fell, and during the same period, 1880-1881, 133 inches of snow fell. Both of these seasons were remarkable for snow; but the one just past exceeds them.—E. J. COYDAL.

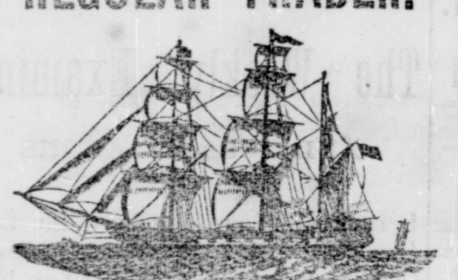
