Prof. Crowe Reinstated In United College Post

WENIPEG (CP)—Professor Harry S. Crowe was reinstated by United College Monday, three months after losing his job over a private letter that went astray. Persons involved in the case, which also resulted in the resignation of the college principal and 15 other professors, could not or would not say how the reinstatement came about.

It was not clear what would happen in the case of Dr. W. C. Lockhart, the principal, and the 15 others. All their resignations were to take effect Aug. 31, 1959, but only three had been accepted by the college before Monday.

Hon. Gordon Churchill, trade minister and one of the 43 members of the board of regents of the college, was believed to have played a key role in the reinstatement, after hearing Prof. Crowe's wish to end the dispute.

A statement issued on behalf of board chairman Allan H. Watson said only that the professor would resume his duties immediately. He was fired last Sept. 15. ENDS "PUBLIC DEBATE"

Prof. Crowe released the text of the memorandum which he handed to Mr. Churchill Saturday. It said that for the good of the college and in the interests of the students, "I am anxious to

effect the termination of the public debate of the affairs of the college, to resume my duties in the classroom, to begin within the walls of the college the process of reconstruction and the restoration of academic confidence in the college."

The controversy began last March when Prof. Crowe, then teaching for one year at Queen's while on leave from United, wrote a personal letter to Dr. William A. Packer at the Winnipeg institution.

Some persons whose identity police have not been able to determine opened the letter and remailed it to Dr. Lockhart with the suggestion that he read it. Dr. Lockhart read the letter and made photostatic copies of it.

After a controversy developed over the matter, the board of regents offered Prof. Crowe a one-year contract after which his job at the college was to end. Later, after seeing a copy of the letter, the board dismissed him on Sept. 15.

A committee of the Canadian Association of University Teachers which investigated the case said Prof. Crowe was a victim of injustice and should be reinstated. However, the board of regents rejected the report.

Dr. Lockhart said in an interview that he was not able to say what his future will be. RESIGNATION STANDS "I'm glad the whole affair is drawing to a close—that is, if it isn't over already," he said. "I've been attacked by both press and public as well as from within United College.

"My position was intolerable and for the good of the college I had to leave. My resignation still stands despite the statement by the board of regents."

Rev. Ross Howard conducted the service. Mrs. Melvin Ellis presided at the organ. Several hymn selections opened the meeting. Scripture lesson Samuel 16, 1-13 was read by the pastor.
