Small Calves Better Says Soviet Expert

MOSCOW (AP)—Biologist Trofim D. Lyenko has advanced a program for cross-breeding and prenatal feeding of cattle to increase milk production and decrease the danger of bovine tuberculosis. The substance of the theory amounts to the breeding of small bulls to large cows of right milk productivity to get small calves that won't endanger the mother at birth but will have the mother's high milk potential; then enrich the mother's feeding during calving time so the offspring will grow big and strong. Lyenko said production of large calves created serious problems, but these could be solved by the breeding of high milk producing cows to bulls of a smaller strain. The biologist said his experiments found that holsteins crossed with jersey bulls produced higher milk yields as well as higher butterfat content. Special feeding during gestation, he said, influenced embryo development along jersey lines. Lyenko's theory that acquired characteristics can be transmitted by heredity won him high favor under Stalin, despite the opposition it generated in scientific circles in the West. After Stalin's death, a Lyenko decline set in, resulting last year in his loss of the presidency of the Soviet Academy of Agricultural Sciences. But since then the Lyenko downturn has been reversed.

Inflation Pushing Costs To Record Levels In U.K.

LONDON (CP)—Just when the British government was getting ready for a nice long snooze, it popped inflation like an important alarm clock to shatter summer's sweet repose. That is a short summary of the domestic political situation inflation has pushed Britain's cost of living to record levels, involving a 48-per-cent increase since 1948. It has become the toughest internal problem confronting Prime Minister Macmillan's Conservative government.

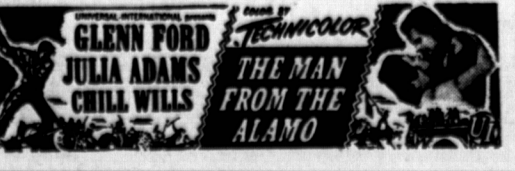

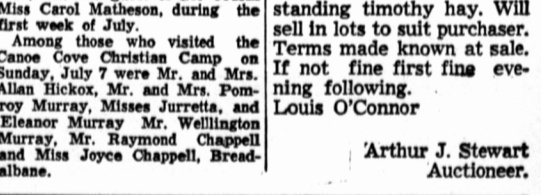

Business & Labor Deaf To Eisenhower's Pleas

WASHINGTON (AP)—Statistics indicated today that American business and labor are substantially ignoring President Eisenhower's repeated pleas that they exercise self-restraint on wages and prices to curb inflation. Wages keep on going up and so do prices—and the data indicate they have been going up more since January than before. It was in January that Eisenhower told the United States in his annual economic report it was time for some labor-management self-denial. Data available from the government and reliable private sources show that wage rate settlements, although they have been few, have been somewhat higher so far in 1957 than in the comparable period in 1956. Prices as reflected by the government's consumer price index—the most widely used measure of the U.S. living costs—have never stopped going up in 1957.

Bad Thunder And Hail Storm

REGINA (CP)—One of the worst hail and thunderstorms of the year slashed 200 miles across Saskatchewan Wednesday afternoon, leveling crops, ripping through summer cottages and destroying farm buildings. The storm, which moved at nearly 20 miles an hour in a northeasterly direction, caused widespread destruction along a narrow path from Coderre, 40 miles southwest of Moose Jaw, to near Kelliher, 70 miles northeast of Regina. No injuries were reported but early estimates indicate damage will amount to thousands of dollars. Many farms reported 100 per cent crop damage. Jack McIntyre, provincial agricultural representative for the Regina area, said 1,000 farms may have been hauled out in his district. Baseball-sized hailstones, 80-mile-an-hour winds and heavy rains lashed at towns and villages, uprooting trees, smashing windows, cutting power and telephone services and tearing roofs off houses.

Maritime Fire Chiefs Meet

YARMOUTH, N.S. (CP)—The Maritime Fire Chiefs Association is opposed to merging firemen and policemen into a single municipal force. The association's annual convention Wednesday approved a resolution of the Canadian Fire Marshals Association calling on members to resist all moves to integrate police and fire forces. Dartmouth, N.S., is reported considering such a step. The convention also urged provincial governments to share with federal and municipal governments the cost of fire equipment for civil defence purposes. In another resolution they asked provinces to ban the sale of fire-
