

Congo Problems Unsolved Despite Katanga Events

UNITED NATIONS (AP)—The military force has ended the Congo's highest crisis, but has by no means solved the Congo problem.

UN officials say it will take years to straighten out the chaotic situation in the former Belgian territory. The central government faces many problems it cannot handle without help.

Steps are being taken to shift the emphasis to civilian aid as a massive long-term project but a stable UN force will be maintained to guard against a new flare-up of violence. There is no thought at UN headquarters of withdrawing UN forces completely.

One of the tasks assigned to the UN originally was to help the central government maintain law and order. That is taken to include stamping any kind of trouble ranging up to civil war.

Trouble could come from two sources. Most likely is an outbreak of tribal warfare, traditional in the Congo. The other possibility is that the power struggle among Congo political factions could lead to a military conflict.

The latter is not expected but the political situation is too uncertain to rule it out. Premier Cyrille Adoula has enemies and the national army has yet to demonstrate how loyal it would be to the government in a political crisis.

At any rate, the UN is not planning to liquidate its Congo force until the situation is much more stable. There will be a sharp reduction, however, and for 2½ years, this will ease much of the financial pressure the UN has felt since it was created in 1948. U.S. Ambassador Adlai Stevenson and UN Secretary-General U Thant also at American exchange the other day, concluded that the major part of the UN Congo job still was ahead.

MUST MAKE REPAIRS
Bunche, also an American, went on to say that reduction of the UN military force would open the gate "for what we really in the Congo for, what we really hoped to, and that is the most massive technical assistance effort in human history."

One of the most urgent problems is the restoration of roads, bridges and railroads damaged or destroyed during the fighting. Other projects include long-term assistance in public administration, education, health, agriculture and engineering.

The capitulation of Katanga President Moïse Tshombe is expected to lead to easing the central government's financial plight. It will be getting a share

of the taxes from Katanga's copper and cobalt mines as soon as production is restored. The UN is pressing for a quick agreement between the central government and Katanga province on a division of these revenues. UN officials also are trying to speed up approval of a constitution under which the Congo would have a federal government.
