DOMINION PARLIAMENT.

A Rumpus in Committee.

THE EGG EXPORT

OTTAWA, April 2. In Committee of Supply on the item for salary equal to that of the Chief Clerk for the balance of year to Mr. Burgess, formerly Deputy Minister of the Interior. Messrs. McCarthy, Mills, Dickey, Somerville and Armstrong made a severe onslaught on Burgess, and evinced a strong disposition to teach the Minister how to administer their respective departments. Mr. Mills (Bothwell) omitted to comment on the fact that the exposed irregularities commenced when he was Minister of the Interior. According to a return presented to Parliament: \$3,000,283 dozen eggs were exported to Great Britain during the past six months.

Another Royal Commission.

MORE DEVELOPMENTS EXPECTED

St. JOHN, April 2. Lieut.-Governor Tiley has been memorialized to appoint a royal commission to enquire into the charges made against the Grit local Government of this Province. There are fifteen or twenty separate charges of corrupt practices in connection with railway subsidies, public works expenditure, appointments to office, and timber regulations.

A Traitor's Work.

LONDON, April 2. Shortly after the arrest at Manchester of Edward Holden, formerly of the Royal Engineers, charged with attempting to learn the secrets regarding the defences of Gibraltar, it was learned that he had sold to the Government of France the full particulars and plans of all the defences at Malta. In consequence of the knowledge gained in this manner by the French Government, British authorities have decided to make extensive changes in the defences at Malta.

Fatal Cloud Burst.

CHICAGO, April 2. Last evening a terrible cloud burst occurred here. The wind drove the rain in sheets along the streets sweeping every movable obstruction before it. A house was blown down and three people were killed.

The Fatal Tornado.

ATOKISON, Kansas, April 2. A tornado struck this city yesterday, unroofing houses, etc. At Iowanda twenty persons were killed and many injured.

New Brunswick Government.

FREDERICTON, April 2. Hon. R. H. Emerson has been made a member of the Executive Council, vice Mr. Harrison, resigned. Mr. Emerson will be the Government leader of the Upper House.

Showing the Cloven Foot.

MONTREAL, April 2. La Patrie, the organ of Laurier here, comes out flatfooted in favor of annexing Canada to the United States.

General Telegraphic News.

St. PETERSBURG, March 30. The condition of the children in the famine districts of the country is deplorable. Many of them, desperate from pangs of hunger, greedily ate whatever rags fell into their possession, and when rags failed them they actually devoured quantities of earth. Those who were able to survive these terrible conditions were in a most miserable plight.

ROME, March 30.—It is stated on good authority that Pope Leo, in anticipation of future difficulties which the Holy See may have to encounter, has deposited in a bank, to be paid to his successor, the sum of five million lire, which have been saved by the economies introduced at the Vatican. This amount is entirely independent of what the next Pope will find in the treasury of St. Peter's pence and represents a special gift made by Leo XIII to his successor.

HAMILTON, Ont., March 30.—Daniel Lilly, the oldest resident in Wentworth county, died in Waterdown a day or two ago at the age of 106 years. He was a tailor by trade and a native of Ireland. He had possession of all his faculties until within the last couple of years. Death was caused by old age. The body was much withered and shrivelled. Decayed used both liquor and tobacco.

PORT DEPOSIT, Md., March 30.—John Everett, a retired farmer, was found yesterday morning drowned in a pump trough with his neck fastened down by a two pronged hay fork, the tines of which had been forced into the trough. He had committed suicide. Everett suffered from ostarrh and was tortured by fears of approaching blindness. He was 69 years old and leaves an estate valued at \$60,000.
