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

INTERESTING INCIDENT.

Hale and hearty is our respected and aged farmer, Hector McFadyen, Esq., of West River, in the 61st year of his age. Mr. McFadyen is tall in stature and a look will convince you of his powerful build, being a survivor of the strong men of the past generation. His mental vigor is good, and being a man of intelligence, he is able with excellent judgment to review and discuss matters affecting the interests of the people, able to read without glasses, if required and never feeling so well he says, as when at work. The young man who attempts to cut as clean a notch in a hardwood log will find some difficulty ahead of him. Mr. McFadyen was, like the most of the early settlers, for years engaged in lumbering and shipbuilding, by which he acquired great skill in the use of tools, and with the broad axe none could excel him. Mr. McFadyen is a history in himself. Having an extensive acquaintance with the people of this Province, and being acquainted with the grandfathers of our public men in the city and a great part of the country, he not require to be told who they are; and if any of the present generation are anxious to get their family history in times gone by we advise them to call on Mr. McFadyen. So too, will he relate to you the West River as it was in his recollection, with almost an unbroken forest, with out roads excepting blazed wood paths, no bridges, the terrific forest fires, the struggles of the early pioneers, and incidents without number of a public and private nature. Mr. McFadyen was a hard working and industrious man, and with his family are in independent circumstances.

Mr. A. C. Shaw, whom Mr. McFadyen highly respects as a friend and neighbour, receiving intimation that Mr. McFadyen desired to accompany him to the polls, called on the aged veteran, who said: I have alone compared carefully the utterances of the leading men on both sides, and I am fully satisfied that the Liberal-Conservative policy of preferential trade, of economy in public affairs, of lower price in goods required by farmers is the right policy; the liberal party having broken their promises of everything the farmer buys being cheaper and everything he sells being dearer as the contrary is the case, and allowing free corn into Canada, which destroyed our oat market, &c. &c.

Sir John McDonald and Sir Charles Tupper built the Pacific Railway, which the liberal's said the resources of the British Empire could not build, and made Canada a great country. In so doing were opposed at every step as they are now. Lightly Mr. McFadyen tripped up the steps of the polling place, and after polling his vote for Mr. Stewart, and in support of the grand old man, Sir Charles Tupper, who is but a few years younger, said: it may be my last vote, but I put it on the right side, without any personal feeling for or against Messrs Stewart or Davies, and I know their families well from first to last.

Mr. McFadyen's brother Hugh, at Georgetown, is two years older and a supporter of Mr. Gordon; his brother Donald, dead some years ago, arrived at the great age of nearly 99 years. Few polls can show such a record as the above.—Com.

KITCHENER'S IRON GLOVE.

Lord Kitchener is now for the first time unhampered in carrying on the South African war, and it promises to be widely different from that under Lord Roberts. The latter will continue to sign the official despatches until his departure, but the campaign will be devised and directed by Lord

Kitchener alone. He has faced the grim fact that the enemy means the entire population, and has greatly tightened the censorship while he finds it necessary to carry out certain military police acts more rigorously than under Lord Roberts' regime.

The Transvaal and the Orange River Colony are now opening the second season since a crop was sown, and it is fourteen months since normal imports of foodstuffs ceased. The railways are still broken for several days weekly. These things combined make the feeding of the occupants of two republics a work of great difficulty which is increased by the filling of the towns with stores for the garrison. These garrisons the inhabitants betray to the commando, who thereby easily replenish their stores, thus making the starving out of fighting burghers impossible. Lord Kitchener's alternative is the depopulation of the towns, moving every non-military inhabitant toward the coast, where they will be more easily fed while freeing the army's hands. This movement will involve great time, and it is doubtful if it is feasible.

Lord Kitchener's movements show the fearful desolation to which the war had reduced the country. The only hopeful sign is the coming of the Transvaal summer, when the heat will make the topical veldt unbearable. The northernmost commandos will have to trek toward the south where they will meet the British. This will bring General Delany shortly into range of severe fighting.

Particulars of the atrocious murder of China Inland missionaries, the Rev. Mr. Thompson and family, have been received at the mission headquarters here. The tidings were sent by the Roman Catholic priest by messengers, who travelled on foot 175 miles, and were then transmitted by mail by the Rev. J. Stewart. The messengers did not give a very clear account of the atrocities as to the personality of the victims of the murderous assault at Kucheo. It seems that certain rangers of pirates had been arrested and carried before the prefect, who had three of the robbers beheaded. The mob demanded that all the prisoners be put to death. The official, however, refused to order this until after an investigation as to their guilt. Becoming alarmed at the threats of the ringleaders of the mob, he fled to a temple. From this he was dragged and searched. Those who searched him claimed to have found papers on him which showed that he belonged to some unpopular secret society. They then took him to a higher official called the Tai To, and demanded that the prefect be executed. This being refused, the mob attributed it to the official's friendship for the missionary, the Rev. Mr. Thompson. The mob, enraged at his refusal to behead his brother official, began murdering all the officials in the building, and killed them all, six in number. When they rushed to the China Inland Mission building. They found the Rev. Mr. Thompson, Mrs. Thompson, and their baby in the house. One ruffian cut off Mrs. Thompson's head with a sword, and murdered the baby, while another killed Mr. Thompson with a bayonet. Four lady missionaries in addition, whose names the messenger did not know, were also murdered. The Roman Catholic priest was away from the city at the time. On his return that night friends were on watch for him on the city wall. As the city gates had been locked, he was drawn up into the city in a basket. He then earned of the frightful events of the day, also that the mob had wrecked his house and that of the China Inland missionaries. He, without delay, despatched messengers with the sad news.

The China Inland Mission officials have now a list of forty-six of their devoted missionaries who have been murdered during the present terrible troubles.
