Canadians Win Fame In American Harness Racing

NEW YORK, (AP) — Does the American harness racing fan realize the mark Canadians have made and are continuing to make in the sulky sport?
Some of trotting's greatest trainers and drivers have come down from Canada to carve their names in our record books — the late Nat Ray, Ben White, and the Flemings from Calgary, to name a few.

The influence was emphasized last Thursday night when six Canadian reinasmen drove in two of the richest stakes of harness racing.
CANADIANS COMPETE
At Roosevelt Raceway on Long Island, Clint Hodgins of Clarendon, Ont., and Cecil Champion of Winchester, Ont., drove in the \$35,000 Roosevelt trot. Hodgins won it a year ago with Katie Key, and in 1948 with the great Proximity. Two weeks ago Hodgins piloted Prince Adios, owned by his brother Grant, to victory in the \$25,000 National Pacing Derby at Roosevelt.

Also Thursday night, Pierce Chappell of Oxford, N. S., drove Choice Hanover in the \$26,000 American Pacing Derby at Vernon Downs, while Bill Simmonds of Toronto handled Malcolm Hanover, and Alx Winger of Gloucester, Ont., drove Poppy Dell.

Nat Ray, who died last year, was one of the game's greatest figures. He drove trotters and pacers for more than half a century after coming out of Whitby, Ont., where he raced on the Canadian circuit. Ray won the first Guy McKinney.

MR. HAMBLETONIAN
White, now 81, has given up driving, but the native of Whitevale, Ont., still trains, and operates Ben White raceway at Orlando, Fla. Benjamin Franklin White was called "Mr. Hambletonian" after winning his fourth victory in the famous three-year-old trot with Yolo Song in 1943. Previously White won the Goshen classic with The Ambassador, Rosalind and Mary Reynolds.

Ned McCarr, who once trained the great Dan Patch 50 years ago, hailed from Charlottetown.

And, while on the subject, two Canadian brothers, J. Elgin and C. E. Armstrong of Brampton, Ont., owned Helicopter, the 1953 Hambleton winner—first foreign-owned horse to capture the race.
AMONG FIRST 10
Of the present day Canadian horsemen, Hodgins and O'Brien have ranked among the first 10 money winning drivers on U. S. tracks for several years. Last season O'Brien, who now calls Sha-

ter, Calif., his home, ranked fourth with \$269,579. Hodgins was fifth with \$233,732, and in 1949 he led all drivers with \$184,108.
Others who have made quite a dent in American trotting include Vic Fleming, and sons Bill, Charlie and Jimmy; Bill Harvey of Norwiche, Ont.; George Rediker, Pitch Bay, Que.; Lorne Tolhurst, Tillsonburg, Ont.; Earle Avery, Knowltonville, N. B.; Ralph Baldwin, Lloydminster, Sask.; W. L. Fraser, Forest, Ont.; Bud Gilmour, Ridgeway, Ont.; and Del MacTavish, Lachute, Que. Most now have homes in the U. S.

Major Twine Wins Queen's Prize

BISLEY, England (Reuters)—Maj. George F. Twine, a former royal artillery officer, Saturday won the Queen's prize, championship of British Commonwealth rifle shooting, with an aggregate score of 278 out of a possible 300.
Twine, now a Hampshire lawyer, scored 63 points out of 75 during the first leg, 15 shots at 900 yards, and had 70, including 11 bulls eyes, with his 15 shots at 1,000 yards.
Runner-up was Maj. N. W. McCaw, a Portsmouth, N. W. Scot, who won the year before. His score was 274, one above his 1953 total.
Six Canadians were among the 100 marksmen who qualified for the final round. Top Canadian was Lt.-Col. Steve Johnson of Calgary, making his sixth trip to Bisley, who finished 18th. He started with 142 from Friday's second stage and added 122 Saturday.

WIND AND RAIN
Wind and rain ruined the aim of many expert marksmen and the unluckiest of all was Sgt. R. B. Cathline of Camp Borden, Ont., the Canadian Bisley team's armorer. After making the top score for the Canadians with 143 Friday, he missed with every shot at 900 yards Saturday. He carried on, however, and started with four bulls at 1,000 to pick up 55 points for the day, giving him a total of 198.

"I don't know what went wrong, I just couldn't find the target," Cathline said.

Other Canadian scores: Sgt. R. S. Potter of Willow Cove, Ont., 20th with 122 and 140 for 262; Maj. A. M. T. Spittal, Victoria, B.C., 37th, 139-118-257; Csm. Norman McLeod, Toronto, 53rd, 140-114-254; Sgt. J. H. Blais, Montreal, 141-106-247.

Friday, Maj. Twine had won the silver medal by scoring 145 in the second stage of the Queen's prize, 10 shots each at 300, 500 and 600 yards.
Last Canadian winner of the prize, which is worth £250, was Lieut. Gilmore Box of Toronto in 1951. Fiver other Canadians have won the prize.
In the international match for the Kolapore Cup, which took place earlier on Saturday, Britain finished first with 1,112 points and Canada was second with 1,096.

Bartzen Defeats Tony Trabert

CHICAGO, (AP)—Bernard Bartzen, of San Angelo, Tex., defeated Tony Trabert of Cincinnati, 6-2, 4-6, 6-0, 6-2, Sunday to win the U. S. clay courts men's singles tennis championship.
It was the first major singles tournament triumph for the 26-year-old Bartzen, a sporting goods salesman. Trabert was seeded No. 1 in the tourney and favored to win. Bartzen, ranked 7th nationally, was seeded No. 4.
Maureen Little Mo Connolly of San Diego Calif., successfully defended her clay courts singles title by overpowering Doris Hart of Coral Gables, Fla., 6-3, 6-1.

TOKYO, (AP)—Gen. John E. Hull, United States Far East commander, leaves for Washington tonight for conferences with military leaders. His trip coincides with the visit to Washington of South Korean President Syngman Rhee, due there Monday for talks with President Eisenhower.

Watched Colt Win Turf Prize

ASCOT, Eng., (AP)—Queen Elizabeth Saturday watched her chestnut colt Aureole splash through the mud to win England's richest turf prize—the £27,650 King George VI and Queen Elizabeth stakes.
The four-year-old Aureole covered the 1-1/2 miles in 2:44.0, finishing three quarters of a length in front of French-owned Vamos. Darrius was third, two lengths further back.
The Queen followed the race with binoculars—and then rushed excitedly to the enclosure to congratulate trainer C. Boyd-Rochford and jockey Eph Smith.
"It was a wonderful performance and how tremendously exciting," she exclaimed. The win was worth £23,502.
Augeole's victory sent the crown wild with excitement and book-makers in Tattersall's famous betting ring shouted "hats off for the Queen."
