SOLDIERS AT WORK.

DAVITT'S ADVICE.

DUBLIN, June 12.

In consequence of the Government's proclamation forbidding the meeting announced to be held at Bodelyke to-day, an extra military force was drafted into service to enable the authorities to enforce the proclamation.

Michael Davitt eluded the authorities, however, and addressed 5,000 people while the soldiers were searching for him. He said he expected this would be the last meeting he would have the chance to address before the Coercion Act would again indulge him with the luxuries of a prison plank bed. Before going into political retirement for six months he would give them this advice: "Boycott the inquisition clauses of the Coercion Act, and welcome imprisonment rather than assist the Government to make the Act operative." He concluded by denouncing the land bill as coming from a government of landlords who would secure their own interest first and Ireland a long way after.

Fisheries Protection—Terrible Accident.

HALIFAX, June 12.

The fishery whopship Acadia sailed yesterday, and will swoop down upon the Yankee poachers now invading Chebucto Bay.

A terrible accident happened to-night which will likely result in the death of a prominent society young lady. Edward Carney and Miss Cicconi, who were to be married, were thrown out of a wagon. Miss Cicconi's jaw was smashed and her skull fractured. She was still unconscious at midnight. Mr. Carney was badly injured. Both were prominent singers and musicians.

Terrible Hurricane.

VIENNA, June 11.

A hurricane and rain-spout occurred yesterday near Mako, and several workmen were washed away. The laborers were driven back to work on the dyke by soldiers.

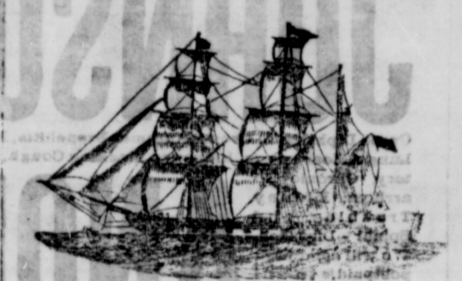
