ILLEGAL PROCEEDINGS.

The Government organ, of Wednesday, has the following editorial item:

"Railway Superintendent Sharp is at Southport and Lot 48, this afternoon, securing rights of way from the farmers along the surveyed portions of the Belfast and Murray Harbor railways."

We invite all honest men in the country to read and ponder this item. Why this wonderful promptness in securing rights of way? What about the amount of compensation that must be fixed before the right of way is signed? Is Superintendent Sharp actually negotiating regarding compensation with landowners, some of whom are the electors of Belfast and others of whom are in a position to use influence in the coming elections?

The whole business smacks of fraud and corruption. Not one inch of ground will be required, under any circumstances, until the snow melts in April. Therefore any dickering just now with the question of right of way is to serve some ulterior purpose.

But the whole proceeding is illegal. The Railway Act clearly provides for what must be done before a railway line is located and rights of way negotiated for. All this is plainly laid down in sections 7 and 8 of said act.

After taking surveys and levels a map or plan and a book of reference must be prepared, containing descriptions of the lands required, the names of the owners and everything necessary to a right understanding of such map or plan, which must be signed by the Minister or Deputy Minister and a copy deposited in a public office.

Sub-section 8 states that until these provisions are complied with the construction of the railway shall not be undertaken.

Sub-section 13 of section 8 of the same act provides as follows:

"After the expiration of ten days from the deposit of the map or plan and book of reference and after notice thereof has been given in at least one newspaper, if there is any published in such of the districts and counties through which the railway is intended to pass, application may be made to the owners of lands, or to persons empowered to convey lands or interested in lands which may suffer damage from the taking of materials or the exercise of any of the powers granted for the railway; and thereupon agreements and contracts may be made with such persons touching the said lands or the compensation to be paid for the service or for the damages, or as to the mode in which such compensations shall be ascertained."

We are informed that no plan or book of reference has been filed in any public office here, and the notice calling for tenders only promises that plans, profile, etc., may be seen at Moncton and Charlottetown after the 27th of November.

Nor have we been able to find that any notice of the filing of the required plan or book of reference has appeared in any newspaper of Queen's County. This being so, any attempts to secure rights of way are wholly illegal. A fresh proof is thus furnished of the bogus character of Government dealing with the Southern Railway.

Superintendent Sharp would be much better employed in discharging the legitimate duties of his office than in engaging in what, under the circumstances, must be regarded as partisan and illegal work.

A day of reckoning may come for all this!

SHARP WORK!

The same number of the Patriot which announced the date of the elections in Belfast and Murray Harbor contained an advertisement signed by Mr. G. A. Sharp, Superintendent, inviting tenders for the grading of ten miles of the Belfast and Murray Harbor railway. Tenders are to be received until the 18th December. Does any person require to be told why this advertisement has appeared simultaneously with the issue of the writs of election? Certainly not. The advertisement is intended to influence the elections, and nothing else.

The call for tenders should have appeared immediately after the prorogation of Parliament. If that had been done the contract could have been signed as early as the 1st of October, and substantial progress could have been made with the work this fall. Straightforward action like that would speak for itself and there could be no doubt that the work would be proceeded with. As it is now the transaction bears all the earmarks of insincerity. The time for receiving the tenders is carefully made to extend some days beyond the date of the elections. Even if one of the tenders should be accepted a contract could not be completed much before the 1st of January,

when everybody knows it would be possible to do any grading on a railway in Prince Edward Island.

Every step taken in connection with the railway affords proof of the duplicity of the Government. The members of the Government who had charge of the P. E. Island Railway Bill last session explained in both houses that they were adopting the policy which the late government presented to Parliament in 1896. Then why not deal with it immediately on the assumption of office in 1896? If not prepared then, why did they not proceed with it in 1897 or in 1898? The postponement of action until 1899 showed want of heart in the project. But the steps taken subsequent to Parliamentary authorization affords the clearest proof of insincerity.

If further proof of bad faith were wanting it is found in Sir Louis Davies' statement at Pownal that the election of Messrs. McLean and Prowse will jeopardize the construction of the Railway. Let the people of Belfast and Murray Harbor show their manhood by trampling this dastardly threat under their feet. They will gain in self-respect by doing so. They will also gain in their material interests. Messrs. Prowse and McLean will have powerful influence with the party which will soon hold the reins both at Ottawa and Charlottetown, and the leaders of that party are the true friends of the southern districts. While Sir Louis Davies was advocating a branch railway from Peake's Station to Wood Islands as all that was necessary, and explaining that his object was to get rid of building a bridge, Senators Ferguson and Mr. Martin, M. P., demanded a straight connection between Murray Harbor and Charlottetown with a spur line to Cardigan touching at Montague Bridge. That policy was accepted in its integrity by the Governments of Sir McKenzie Bowell and Sir Charles Tupper, and it is the policy of the Conservative party to-day.

Every vote given for Messrs. D. A. McKinnon and D. P. Irving is a vote against the cross line, against connection of the south with the winter steamer,—a vote against a completed railway system for the southern district rendering it possible to furnish station facilities to all the more important sections of the country.
